THIS BUILDING MAY NOT BE HERE MUCH LONGER



It is now over three years since the old school site was vacated and as Peter Trevena, Senior Provision, Planning and Emergency Management Officer for the South Eastern Victoria region of the Department of Education and Training, explained last year it is a lengthy Process and there are many steps to go through before they disposed of the site.

In an email received in June he states “....demolition plans for the old school have progressed. The Department has engaged a consultant to coordinate the demolition process over June/July 2016 in a plan that should allow all buildings to be demolished by the end of July.

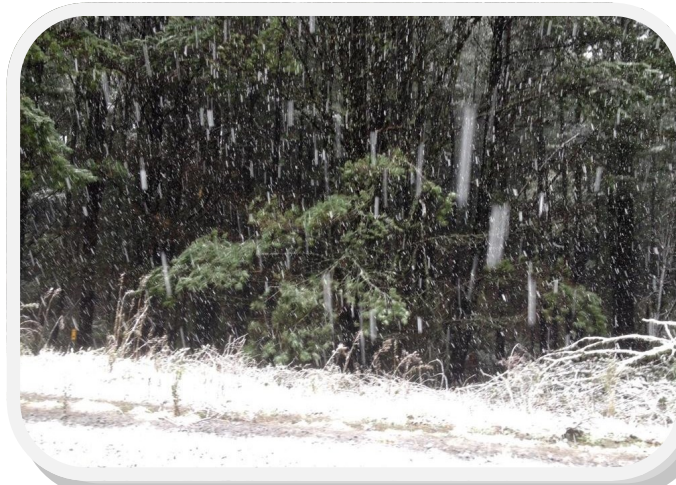
During this process there will be contractors entering the school site and, to gain access to the buildings, they will be removing shutters from the doors.

If you have any concerns about the work occurring on site just let me know and I will investigate and report back as needed.

Note: Building demolition will be a separate process to sale and disposal of the site. While the buildings will be demolished in the near future the site still remains the property of the Department of Education and Training and retains the “Closed School” status until property sale (transfer to another owner) is achieved. At this point in time it is unclear when the property-sale/ownership-transfer might be achieved.

The Station Gallery By Carol Monson

If you live in Yarragon you will know there is a railway station but have you been able to find time to visit *The Station Gallery*?

The Station Gallery is run by members of the *Baw Baw Arts Alliance* and provides a wonderful space in which local artists exhibit and sell their work. Yarragon is fortunate in having a wide range of places selling art and craft, each one with its own twist. *The Station Gallery* is unique in that it is a not-for profit outlet staffed by volunteers who are often surprised that local people have not yet visited the gallery.

If you are looking for a quality, handmade gift go no further than *The Station Gallery* where creations range through all art forms, fibre, mosaic, painting, drawing, sculptures. Expect to see a variety of such artworks at the July exhibition titled 'Winter Warmers'. Much of the work is a result of the master classes in ceramics, watercolour and felt-work, the *Baw Baw Arts Alliance* held as part of *Creative Gippsland's* programme in May. This exhibition runs for the whole of July until the August exhibition, 'Sense of Place'.

As well as the regular static exhibitions, which change every month, there are workshops taking place in the workshop/gallery room. On the first Wednesday of each month, between 10.30am and 3.30pm, Marlene Ogden is working on a community project called the 'One Million Stars to End Violence Project'. This is an opportunity to learn to weave an 8-pointed decorative star with a purpose. The project aims to create one million stars to install on the Gold Coast for the Commonwealth Games in 2018. Marlene will provide instruction to anyone who would like to drop in. Materials, tea and coffee are provided.

On the second Wednesday of each month in *The Station Gallery*, at 10.30am a 'Mindful Colouring' group is meeting to colour or you can choose to do 'Zen Doodling' if that is your preference.

If creating stars or colouring is not something that interests you call in on the third Saturday of each month at 10.30am to take part in 'The Writers' Café'. It is a chance to enjoy a quiet space without other distractions so that you can write. Take any work and \$5 to contribute to gallery running costs. Other workshops take place regularly at the railway station *Artspace* in Trafalgar.

Please put *The Station Gallery*, Yarragon and *Artspace*, Trafalgar on your 'must visit soon' list. They are venues of which Yarragon and Trafalgar can be proud.

Finally:

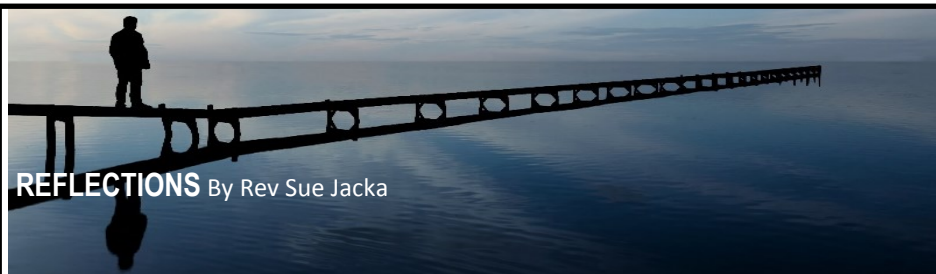

REFLECTIONS By Rev Sue Jacka

As I write this I am in the middle of the refugee rations challenge. For one week I can only eat the same food as the Syrian refugees who are living in camps in Jordan. It's not much- mainly rice, 400g of flour, a handful of lentils and chick peas, a tin of sardines, a can of kidney beans and 300ml oil. It's hard to make interesting or creative food and I have found myself using the oil to add more energy to the day's intake. People have been generous in sponsorship- many of us have been moved by the devastation in Syria. Of course I get to eat normally after my week- for the refugees these rations will continue- if they are lucky enough to get their share.

I have realised how much we Aussies use food as part of our lifestyles: we invite people over for meals, we go out for coffee (not in the rations), we treat ourselves or the kids to a snack. I'm certainly noticing what I cannot eat and I wonder about the dehumanising effect of living off such basic rations.

The war in Syria is so complex that it is beyond my understanding- I'll leave that to the UN and pray for peace. However, by doing this challenge I can at least raise funds to help a number of the 10 million Syrians who have fled their homes. It's one way to follow Jesus' golden rule: 'Do to others as you would want them to do to you.' Matt 7:12

Jaffas afterschool program finished the term with a sausage sizzle for participants and their families. There was also a special afternoon tea made by the kids

for some representatives of the Lions club executive, Kevin, Tony and Richard so that they could see how their donation had been spent.

Our new youth and family worker Steph Norris has been getting to know the children and their families. On Tuesday we discovered that she's a dab hand in the kitchen teaching the kids to cook and with two sons, she is very aware of the needs of primary school children.

From our Own Correspondent

At the Mechanics Institute on Tuesday evening the 25th ult Mr Furphy, representative of the Metropolitan Milk Suppliers Co-operative Coy, Ltd. addressed a meeting of dairymen. Mr W. Davies officiated as chairman and introduced the speaker.

Mr Furphy explained that the object of the meeting was the formation of a company consisting solely of dairymen, having for its object the control of the milk supply for Melbourne. Both the producer and consumer would benefit as a more uniform price for milk would result. Up to the present the milk supply was controlled by a few big retailers and -was anything but satisfactory to either the producer or consumer. In the Spring when milk was plentiful with perhaps a slight surplus the price of milk dropped to such an extent that it scarcely paid the producer to continue sending his milk to the city-independent of the fact that he was probably stopped for days at a time from forwarding any milk to Melbourne. Though this sort of thing often happened to the producer it did not necessarily follow that the price dropped in the same proportion to the consumer, who still had to pay a big price for milk in spite of the alleged surplus. The object of the company was to stop that sort of thing and make the price more uniform. If a surplus of milk existed

at any time, there were other means of disposing of it without stopping the supplies. As an illustration of the proprietary system, he stated that if the dairyman was obtaining 8d per gallon for his milk, it took three men on the farm to earn that 8d, while one man on the cart in the city pocketed 1/. Mr Furphy further stated that though the company had only been formed a short time, there were already over 700 dairymen as shareholders, with some able men as Directors at the head of affairs. Until things were in good going order and on a firm footing, the company proposed renting certain premises with suitable machinery and with sufficient capacity for present requirements for carrying on the business until such time as they were in a position to erect buildings of their own. At the conclusion of his address, a number of questions were asked and satisfactory replies given in each case. In response to an inquiry if anyone present desired to take up shares the result was most gratifying. Dairymen were so convinced of the soundness of the scheme that 135 shares were taken up in the room, 95 were taken up shortly afterwards, in addition to those acquired earlier in the day, a total of 340 shares. There seems every prospect of the company turning out successful.
