Continuing her efforts, on the 5th August, Sticcado's is supporting the Café Smart Fundraiser bringing awareness and much needed funds to Youth services.

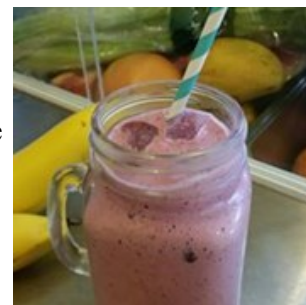

Sustainable Energy. Maybe Not What You Think!

Sustainable energy isn't some trendy or hippie dippie concept. Basically it is living within our energy means. As with a household, farm or business you have to live within your means so we as a technologically advanced civilisation need to live within our energy means. If we want to maintain our standard of living into the near future we are going to have to seek out and utilise sustainable energy sources.

Fossil fuels will run out, it is just a matter of time. I have heard estimates as short as 40 years for oil based energy sources. Yes new sources of oil are being discovered and more difficult to mine sources are becoming economically viable but this will only buy time in the short term. It will also hit our hip pocket harder and harder. There is only so much uranium in the ground and if more countries start using this as an energy source it too will become exhausted. It's not all doom and gloom though.

We won't be slipping back to the Stone Age. Solar, wind, hydro and Bio fuels are all sources that we hear of already and as fossil fuels become less accessible these alternate sources of energy will become far more viable. In future articles I'll be writing about more exotic sources of energy that are on our horizon.

In this series of articles I'd like to try and help you understand what sustainable energy is and why it is our future.

The terms "Sustainable" and "Renewable" have been linked but I'd like to make the distinction between the two clear. An energy source may be renewable but may not be sustainable.

Lets use a wood burning fire as an example. Trees are a **renewable** energy source for heating. If you are not growing trees faster than you are cutting them down, then they are not a **sustainable** energy source.

Our energy supply in the future will not come from a single source but from a blend of sources and to better position ourselves to effectively use these sources we will need to reduce wasteful consumption.

My main motivation for getting to grips with Sustainable energy is not to be green, yes I try to be green where I

can but being that I have recently retired, it's my hip pocket. Many sustainable energy sources (solar, wind, water movement) are free after the initial outlay for the hardware. This is not to say that Sustainable Energy is the domain of the individual user either. Sustainable energy can be generated and distributed at a local community or national level.

Now let me address the elephant in the room seeing as we live so close to the coal fired power stations of today. Yes this does mean that power stations fired by coal will cease to exist or at most only be a backup to sustainable energy power stations. **But...** we are going to need the expertise of the people who currently maintain and run those stations to build, maintain and run the new power stations. I see these new power systems being safer and cleaner for the people who build and run them. As I said earlier, this will be a series of articles and I don't want to overload you with information in the first article so I'll conclude for this month with a couple of thoughts and what I think is a good definition of sustainability.

The University of Melbourne's Energy Research Institute has developed a plan to get all of Australia onto renewable sustainable energy in 10 years and deliver power to we consumers at \$8 per household per week. I'm currently spending \$9 per day on electricity (yes it's winter and summer is about half that but I'd love to only be paying \$8 a week). Australia is arguably one of the best landmasses on the planet to harvest and distribute solar-based power with our relatively flat terrain and abundant sun bathed uninhabited areas. We could generate and sell power to the likes of New Zealand and South East Asia.

"The United Nations report 'Our Common Future' produced by the Brundtland Commission in 1987. The Commission defined sustainable development, as 'development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs' (United Nations, 1987). The Brundtland Commission's view that developments should not compromise the needs of future generations, suggest that we should judge the sustainability of energy systems on an indefinite time scale – far into the very distant future. Yarragon Lions Club News

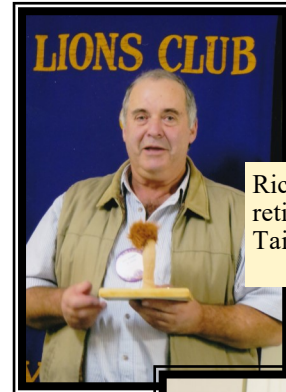

Saturday in full swing.

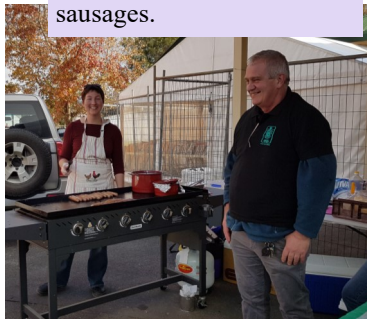

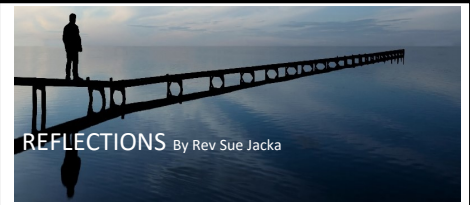

I recently spent a couple of days of my holidays doing hands on revegetation at Raymond Island. A small group of us has pulled out Polygala and Tahitian bridal veil- two pretty but exceptionally invasive weeds. We have planted lots of indigenous species- mainly Boobiala, Lomandra, Banksia and coastal Melaleuca. The flood waters from the Mitchell and Nicholson Rivers have raised the water level of the lakes significantly, giving a whole new feel to the place. The ferry is out so the island is much quieter and the birdsong seems louder. It's one of those places where you can instantly relax as the busyness of everyday life recedes and a sense of calm is pervasive. And there is a timelessness about this process of restoring creation, something about being part of the care of the earth that is re-creation for us.

There is a very special place, the Abbey, which was once a campsite but is now becoming established as a centre for the environment and spirituality. It's the reason Ross and I came to clear away introduced species and to plant indigenous varieties which will allow the plentiful wildlife to feed and find shelter. It's part of taking seriously the command God gave to Adam to be a good steward of the earth, to care for it for future generations. (Genesis 1:28b) Farmers know this well- you cannot allow the weeds to take over. Huge patches of blackberries or hawthorn mean less productive land. There's also a metaphorical reading- as we clear away invasive habits in our own lives, we have more emotional and spiritual space for positive ways.

A HYDROTHERAPY POOL ?

The first notion of some-one wanting a hydrotherapy pool came from a nurse at Andrews House in Trafalgar. Hydrotherapy is the use of immersion in warmed (or cold) water to relieve discomfort and promote physical wellbeing.

The nurse told me such a facility would be so good for the fifty-one residents of the nursing home. The cost of building and maintaining a specialist pool cannot be supported by 51 residents only. A member of the Trafalgar cricket club has indicated sporting groups could benefit from a hydrotherapy facility locally. He tells me the sporting community, in Gippsland, includes people who travel all the way to Olympic Park, Melbourne, for medical attention to sports injuries and treatment, including hydrotherapy.

What other groups could be considered for this service in our community. By community for this purpose, I think Yarragon, Trafalgar, Thorpdale, Willowgrove, Tanjil and surrounds. How many residents are currently receiving hydrotherapy at the Latrobe Valley Hospital or at Melbourne pool, as a result of a doctor's referral, who would prefer one closer? There will be a hydrotherapy facility in Warragul once the refurbished pool opens in September.

How many people would be better served by such a pool built in Trafalgar? Are there waiting lists at other facilities? Would people prefer to travel the shorter distance to Trafalgar. What are specific needs a hydrotherapy pool could be used for? How many local residents have referrals for hydrotherapy from Workcover, the Traffic Accident Commission, the NDIS or through private insurance?

In order to build a business case for a hydrotherapy pool in our community we need to learn about numbers in all of the above cases. I am interested in hearing from you so a picture can be built. Like the aspiration of our shire written in its Health and Wellbeing Plan, we all want to be part of "vibrant community living". Please, leave your ideas and comments at

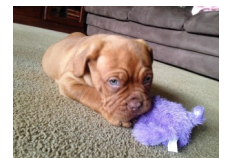
