I doubt that we will ever break that record.

Pam continued to maintain a keen interest in the newsletter for the rest of her life, contributing articles and providing information whenever she could. Yarragon and the community were so dear to her heart. Our condolences to her husband, Ken, and her sons Kyle, Richard and Andrew.

With clear skies starting the day, we were looking to have a nice sunny winters market... but unfortunately the forecast clouds did eventually arrive and brought some light drizzle along with it.

Luckily for our mostly indoor market, we had the heaters going inside which

helped take the chill off the air (inside at least!).

New stall Little Red Bucket set up outside next to Hope Farm bread, and they had some great food with some great reviews from their loyal customers. With Italian heritage, and a chef in the family, they sure know how to make fantastic Italian food. Their take home meals included lasagne, Napoli sauce, pork meatballs, cannelloni, vegetarian lasagne, chicken cacciatore, the very popular traditional gnocchi, and a variety of pizzas ready to go. Their home made pesto and dips were also delicious. They had a great market and will be back next month, so make sure you head over to ask them more about their products.

With Jam Judy away for a couple of months, we had a replacement in the kitchen and that was regular stall holder Bonnie. Bonnie usually sells her fruit cakes and a few other items, but with a love of cooking and also being in charge of the Rokeby

market kitchen, she was keen to take the reigns for couple of months. And she did a great job, selling

out of her chicken and vegetable soup and also running short on some of the other items including toasted ham tomato and cheese sandwiches, egg and bacon sandwiches, satay chicken pies, pork and apple sausage rolls, blueberry muffins and homemade chocolate cake. Judging and Social Media

THE HISTORY BEHIND OUR STREET NAMES

The settlement of our town began in 1877 when it was known as Little Moe. It was renamed Waterloo when the construction of the railway began, but because of the confusion with another town in Victoria, near Beaufort, named Waterloo, and mail going to the wrong place, it was changed to Yarragon. The township of Yarragon was proclaimed on 14 April 1885. It was laid out by John Lardner and street names were chosen to honour Governors of Victoria and pioneers. South of the station Rollo Street, named for John Rollo, formed the township's eastern boundary. Hann Street (for James Hann), later Campbell Street (for John Campbell) ran south then south-east to form the start of the road to Leongatha. Murray Street and Murray's Road commemorated another leading family. Market Street, running east-west recalls plans for a market in early days. Main Street, the Princes Highway today, was once Bawden Street for William Bawden. North of the station Waterloo Road becomes Bowen Street for the Governor Sir George Ferguson Bowen. Loch Street, running north and south through the town, was named for Governor Sir Henry Brougham Loch. So Tall The Trees by John Adams P 69

Rollo Street

John Rollo came from Brandy Creek, where he had practised his building trade for some years, to take up a selection at Waterloo in 1877. From then he was a leading force in many ventures in the district. He carried on his building trade, building many of the early buildings in the town, including St. Mark's Church of England, a neat little structure of wood with a belfry tower, in 1879, on four acres of land bought the year before and cleared by Mr. Rodier.

He was also a contractor for Road construction.

When the Narracan Shire was formed, the first elections took place 12 November 1878. From a field of fourteen, nine councillors were elected: John Rollo, Waterloo, James Thomas Hann, Robert Robinson, "Narracan Park", Samuel Vary, Driffield, John Proctor, Childers, Thomas Hume, John Lloyd, Narracan West, John Wood, Moe, and Michael James O'Connor, Narracan. The new councillors met on 27 November and elected John Rollo the first Shire president. John Rollo served on council from 1878 – 1886.

Because the roads south of Yarragon were impassable for much of the year due to wet and mud, the Victorian Government was approached to construct a five mile

tramway south from the town to McDonald's Track. John Rollo was the instigator. Three weeks after the railway station was opened at Waterloo in 1878 the Government was invited to carry out the work but did not do so. Mr Rollo went into partnership with Mr Skinner and in 1879 they built a tramway to carry timber from their mill, one and a half miles east of the station. Their mill, known as "Waterloo Steam Sawmills" was powered by a 12 hp steam engine. It was located on the west bank of Rollo Creek, south of the bridge that now crosses Rollo Creek on Yarragon South Road.

In 1883 a new company was formed, cuttings and bridges were made and four miles of tramway was completed to take it to the top of the range. By July 1883, the mill was ready to operate, to fulfil a contract with the Melbourne City Council for the supply of one million cubic feet of blue gum blocks to pave the city streets. Mr Rollo was the manager of the works.

In August, 1884 on the eve of his return to England, John Rollo was presented with a gold watch and praised for his tremendous contribution to the town at a function at the Commercial Hotel. He returned from England in 1885. However, he did not go back to managing the timber mill although he remained a share-holder. In 1886 it is reported that he resigned from council to go mining in the Kimberleys.

In May 1888 Rollo located a thick seam of brown coal a

short distance south west of Yarragon on William Roberts' selection, allotment 4, township of Yarragon. With William Bawden he tested in different locations and was encouraged enough to launch the Yarragon Brown Coal Mining Co. Work went ahead, sinking a shaft and erecting a poppet head, engine house and watertank. Water was a problem at the site, but the coal seam over 12 m thick, was enough to compensate for that. The Railways erected a spur-line from the Yarragon Station to serve the mine, costing 1139 pounds, of which the company paid 250 pounds.

Despite John Rollo going to Germany with samples of his coal in 1890, where experts were impressed and although the coal was commented on favourably by Government Department Offices, where it was used as fuel, problems mounted and the company eventually forfeited its lease in 1895.

John Rollo possessed titles for three properties, one on the Strzelecki foothills south of the town, one small block on the eastern side of the Moe River, south of the railway, and one at the Eastern end of the township.

The creek known as Rollo's Creek flowed through his property, and Rollo Street was also near his property.

CONNECTING YARRAGON 2030 PROJECT UPDATE

WHAT WILL YARRAGON be like in 2030?

About 140 people responded to the survey, which was made available on-line, and was also sent to every household, business and rural mailbox in the 3823 postcode area.

Questions asked respondents to reflect on what they liked about Yarragon, and what they would like to see improved.

About 140 people responded. We have to assume that those who didn't respond are happy enough for others to speak for them, or that they don't have an opinion one way or the other. As far as the normal response rate to surveys goes, 140 responses is actually pretty good.

The results of the survey are available on the website www.connectingyarragon.com

Scroll across the tabs to 'survey results'.

Over 50% of respondents have lived in Yarragon for 10 years or less, and almost a third moved to Yarragon for the lifestyle. The top three aspects we like about living & working in Yarragon are community connection, friendly, and convenience. We want roads better maintained, more parking, and better town maintenance.

Some answers indicated clear majorities. Most people want additional train passenger parking behind platform 2. Most people would buy local produce if it was available. Most people would like there to be a walking/bike/horse trail between Yarragon and Trafalgar.


Many people recognise that reserving some of the old school site for a larger fire station would be a good idea. Many respondents would like there to be more community and social events in Yarragon, but less than half volunteer their time to community and social groups.

Of course, there were also very clear differences of opinion... we want larger housing blocks but we don't want houses on valuable farmland. We want smaller

houses for retirees, single people, and families on low incomes, but some people say they'll move if we get any more town houses. We don't want population growth, but we want a bigger supermarket AND a butcher AND a produce store AND a swimming pool. We accept that the world's population is increasing, but we don't want Yarragon to get any bigger ... obviously the survey is only the first step in preparing a document that accurately reflects residents' hopes for Yarragon's future.

The 40 people who attended the four 'open house' sessions that were held over May found plenty to talk about. YDCA will be approaching other community groups to have discussions about the survey, and we'll be asking council's Community Development team to add their professional skills to the project, which is due to be completed in 2019.






New Officers for Yarragon Fire Brigade

Yarragon Fire Brigade has recently held elections for brigade officers for the next two years. CFA Regulations require that volunteer fire brigades conduct elections to choose those members who will manage the day-to-day activities of the brigade. The Yarragon brigade held their biannual elections on Monday 14th May where a number of members took on new roles.





Ashley will be supported by a Brigade Management Team that includes, Michael O'Toole as first lieutenant, Melinda Kemp as second lieutenant, Kris Hopkins as third lieutenant and Colin Lackman as fourth lieutenant. Michael, Melinda and Kris have all served as officers for some time and are very experienced and capable firefighters. Colin commences his first term as an officer this year and is already undertaking further training in fire management.

Supporting these officers are Andrew Sterling as Community Safety Coordinator, who will focus on community education and safety programs, Geoff Conway as brigade secretary and training coordinator, and Russell Hastings as treasurer.

Yarragon Fire Brigade, like most CFA brigades, is a fully volunteer service. None of the members or officers are recompensed for the work they do in protecting the community. All the officers elected in May are local residents who have chosen to take on these roles as a way of supporting their friends, family and neighbours in time of need. They all bring extensive skills from their professional lives to the firefighting task. BAW BAW ARTS ALLIANCE

May is always a busy month for the Arts in Gippsland because the annual

Creative Gippsland programme encourages a wide range of visitors to this area of Victoria.

As part of activities the Baw Baw Arts Alliance invited all its members to contribute to an exhibition called *Dot Points*, displayed in *The Station Gallery*, Yarragon. This was a challenging theme which produced many surprising results. Exhibition judge and well known artist, Kerrie Warren, described the display as 'diverse, colourful and exciting to walk through.' She referred to the 'magnificent fabric wall hanging that demanded (her) attention on

entering', the 'imaginative gourdes that took centre stage', and to the 'beautifully executed cartoon drawings on a corner wall'.

What drew Karrie's greatest attention however were two works very different from each other. She awarded first prize to Heather

Brimblecome for her felt artwork, 'Thinking Cap'. In Kerrie's words Heather's art enchanted her 'with its crystalline like dots that appeared to be growing in the fabric itself not stuck on as an addition.'

Kerrie awarded second prize to Russell Monson for his powerful black and white photograph of a drinking fountain, 'Bubbler'. She felt the photographic image beautifully captured the theme *Dot Points* in a seemingly uncomplicated way, both through the lens and the reflections captured.

Elisabeth Smoorenburg received the 'Packers' prize and Donna Mitchell won 'Peoples' Choice' award.

Such accolades from an artist of the calibre of Kerrie should encourage everyone to visit the gallery that is becoming well known for the wide range of art displayed by local artists. Not to be missed during July is the work of felter, Cheryl Cook. Cheryl works with fibre that she dyes, stitches and paints, thus producing her art works that make their own unique statements. Having studied under United Kingdom artist Kate Horner, Cheryl has been able to venture into forms of felting very different from what is often exhibited. Her large textile pieces are often more rug like than painterly, abounding in texture and colour. Her exhibition, aptly titled, *An*

Unconventional Journey...From the Beat of the City to the Heart of our World, is one of experimental art requiring large wall spaces for the heavily textured pieces. Don't miss some of the works however that could be described as more painterly. Open from July 4 to July 29 the work will be at *The Station Gallery*, Yarragon and on the final day, Sunday, July 29, at 2.00pm, Cheryl will be providing a free demonstration of some of the felting techniques she will be using.


