YARRAGON CATHOLIC CHURCH. A MAGNIFICENT STRUCTURE. OPENING AND DEDICATION.
 The Roman Catholic of Yarragon should indeed be proud of their new church, which for elegance and finish compares most favorably with any sacred edifice. in the district.
 The opening ceremony took place on Sunday morning last, the officiating clergymen being the Revs. Father Coyne.,(Warragul), Father Coleman, (Morwell), and the Very Rev. Father Maher, O.M, (of Melbourne).
 The pretty little church was well filled, and the enthusiasm with which the adherents of the religion have entered into the determination of speedily having the building free of debt can be gauged from the fact that nearly £100 was realised by the special collection in aid of the building fund. The ceremony of blessing the church was impressively performed,by, the Rev Father Coleman, and the Rev. Father Coyne conducted mass.

John the veggie man was returning, Cheryl had her seedlings all potted for sale, we had an egg-cellent sale on our local free range eggs, and all the regular stalls were geared up for action. And the food stalls sold like hot cakes! The fruit and vegetable stall reported their best market for quite some time, we sold twice as many eggs as usual with the special we had on them, and Hope Farm bread also had their best day in some time.

Cheryl was rushed off her feet selling the seedlings, with a couple of phone calls made to her husband for backup stock. She does a great job growing these each year from her property and always does well at the markets. She'll be back next month with some more seedlings for those that missed out. THE HISTORY BEHIND OUR STREET NAMES

The Murray Family

Comprising: Jack, George and their sisters Margaret (Madge) and Catherine (Nina).

Mr Andrew Murray was Mayor of Balwyn and named that suburb.

Early in 1876 one of his sons, Jack, received a letter from a companion which read – “Dear Jack, come up to Gippsland and take up a selection. The land is the very best in the world. All you have to do is cut the scrub, and burn it. You can sew English grasses in the ashes. After the Autumn rain the grass comes up at once, and in six weeks you can put cattle on and fatten them.”

The letter led to Jack, George and Margaret taking up selections as near as possible to where they thought the railway station would be placed. Jack’s area was 320 acres, Margaret’s was 160 acres and George 290, making 770 in all.

They little knew what they were letting themselves in for.

The land is situated to the North of Murray Rd, between Loch Street and Hazeldean Rd.

George Murray later wrote, “Though we were in the heart of a mighty forest, it took a considerable time to get sawmills into working order and to have our homes built. We had to rely on the pit saw and pit-sawyers to furnish the sawn timber for them. We moved from our tents into a partially built house and were glad to get under a roof as sixty inches of rain fell that year, and while we had lived under canvas we hardly knew what it was to have a dry blanket to sleep on, or a dry shirt to put on.”

The old home by the big oak tree first had a shingle roof, later replaced by iron. Bricks were made on the site for a double chimney and wash-house.

When the house was completed they were joined by their mother, Jessie Murray, and sister Catherine.

The family later owned a house in the main street of Yarragon and also had a small property near the Moe River.

Sheehan as manager.. The pioneer directors were Thomas O’Toole, Michael Harvey, Harry Williams of Allambee, J P Mahoney and R Roberts with George Murray as secretary.

All four of the family maintained their single status. Murray Street and Murray’s Road perpetuates their name.

Mrs Murray died in November 1888, at the age of 67 years. A falling limb from a tree struck her on the head. Lack of medical attention and blood poisoning caused her death.

Jack Murray died at the age of 72 in March 1922. Catherine died in January, 1933, aged 80. Madge was 77 when she died in 1935 and George Houston Murray lived to the age of 83 when he was buried in January 1938. George Murray had a genial nature and a good sense of humour.

There were some beautiful trees around his home which they named “Balbreccan” meaning the home of the bracken.

I found this article by Dorothy Murray I do not know that she was related but it is an interesting perspective of a 13 year old. It was published in the Leader, 21 July 1906.

AN AUSTRALIAN WINTER. Yarragon, 23/6/1906.

Dear Cinderella, — I will take for my subject, "An Australian Winter," or rather, "A West Gippsland Winter." It is at present cold and wet, the whole district presenting a very dismal aspect indeed. The sky is heavy, dull, grey, and the rain is pouring pitilessly down on the sodden earth. The great, dead gumtrees on the hills look gaunt and spectral in the fast deepening dusk. Last year we had snow three times. I woke up in the morning, and saw that everything was covered in glistening white snow. I was afraid we were going to have it again this year, but I don't think we will now. The creeks are roaring down the hillsides in a foaming, brown torrent leaping from rock to rock forming miniature falls. A few days ago we had some very severe frosts which killed a great number of plants in gardens on the flats. There were also, several heavy fogs, but we, who live on the hills do not have them so badly as those on low lying ground. These fogs do not clear away until about (11) eleven o'clock, and one standing on a hill would, imagine that one was looking at a sea, stretching away to the mountain beyond. Have you ever experienced a Gippsland fog, Cinderella? If you have, I am certain you may never want to do so again, as they are so bitterly cold, but they have one good advantage, and that is, that the day is always so lovely after it. I must now tell you about the pleasant part of this winter. Until about a week ago the weather was exceptionally fine. The days were bright with sunshine, and the roads were actually dusty, a very wonderful thing indeed for West Gippsland. — I remain yours sincerely, DOROTHY MURRAY. 13 yrs.

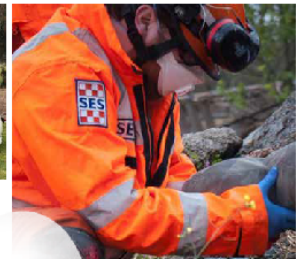

Local Choirs Prepare for a Musical Adventure

The Latrobe Chorale and the West Gippsland Chorale have begun an exciting project preparing to participate in an exciting musical event. Both choirs will be performing in a production of Sir Karl Jenkins' new work, *Symphonic Adiemus* and Giacomo Puccini's much loved *Missa di Gloria*. The concert will be on November 25 at 3p.m. in Warragul. It will be presented in the newly developed West Gippsland Arts Centre (WGAC).

For the concert, the Latrobe Chorale and the West Gippsland Chorale will join the Heidelberg Choral Society and a forty-five piece orchestra to present the two very different works. The performance will be conducted by Peter Bandy,

Symphonic Adiemus is a contemporary composition that was conceived by Sir Karl Jenkins to draw on both classical principles and the flavours of world music. It uses the massed choir as a musical instrument and they will sing in a totally made up language with the orchestra and a variety of percussion instruments.

Puccini's *Messa di Gloria* was first performed in 1880 and is a much loved piece in the western classical music tradition. For this work the choirs and orchestra will be joined by soloists Jeremy Kleeman (bass baritone) and Timothy Reynolds (tenor) to make a very special afternoon of music.

The West Gippsland Chorale is based in Warragul where they are conducted by Simon Loveless and accompanied by Lisa Fraser. The

Latrobe Chorale rehearses in Morwell with their musical director Mary Mirtschin and pianist Brian Chapman. Singers in the two choirs are drawn from a wide area of Central and West Gippsland. With the Heidelberg Choral Society and their orchestra coming from Melbourne for this concert, there will be more than two hundred singers and musicians on the stage.

The re-developed WGAC auditorium will be able to accommodate an audience of more than 600 people, so the choirs are hoping for a big turn out for this exciting event.

Tickets are on sale now and cost \$45 full price or \$40 concession.

Those under eighteen pay \$20, and group booking tickets for ten or more people will cost \$40.
