THE HISTORY BEHIND OUR STREET NAMES

Loch Street

Sir Henry Brougham Loch, Governor of Victoria 1884 to 1889 Sir Henry Brougham Loch, Governor of Victoria, was born in Edinburgh, Scotland, in 1827. At the age of 13 he began service as a mid-shipman in the navy, continuing until he was 15; at 17 he was commissioned in the Bengal cavalry and was ADC to Lord Gough in the Sutlei campaign in 1845. Loch was sufficiently capable to organise irregular Turkish cavalry in the Crimean War, and in 1857-58 accompanied Lord Elgin's mission to China. He impressed Elgin, and in 1860 returned to China with Elgin as his private secretary. He negotiated the surrender of the Taku ports on the way to Beijing, but was captured and endured ill-treatment. On his release and return to England, Loch decided to resign from the army, and became Private Secretary to the Home Secretary. In 1863, at the age of 36, he married the well-connected Elizabeth Villiers. In 1863 he was appointed Lieutgovernor of the Isle of Man, a post he held for 19 years. On 15 July 1884 he was appointed Governor of Victoria. He was considered Victoria's most popular and respected governor.

Like other governors, Loch had little to do with political affairs; the appointment of an agent-general to communicate with London meant that he had little access to confidential information and could only write superficial reports. He was active, however, in his discussions with Britain on naval affairs and Chinese immigration, although his influence on policy was slight. He was socially successful as a Governor, and his wife was an active philanthropist who in 1887 helped to organise the Queen's Jubilee fund for the 'relief of suffering womankind'.

Loch was patron of the 1888 Melbourne Centennial International Exhibition and officially performed the opening, for which he was presented a medal [NU 16453]. The following year he went on leave to England, and was appointed High Commissioner for South Africa and Governor of Cape Colony. He returned

briefly to Melbourne and resigned as governor on 15 November 1889. On his return to England Loch was created baron. He sat with the Liberal

Unionists in the House of Lords. Loch died on 20 June 1900, aged 73. He was survived by his wife, son and two daughters.

Apologies, change and trust

The federal government has made a national apology to all those who have been affected by sexual abuse. The speeches from both the prime minister and the leader of the opposition acknowledged the failure of state and institution to protect or vulnerable children, an incredibly important step on the healing journey. Such abuse has huge ramifications; not only the survivors, but also their families and community members have had their trust betrayed. People have lost faith in the state and other institutions. I personally have been horrified when told how the local authorities' response was that they were interfering trouble makers when they made complaints about a perpetrator's behaviour.

How can such trust be rebuilt? I believe the national redress scheme must provide adequately for those affected so that they can get the support necessary to work through their trauma. I believe that local institutions (church, police, schools, youth groups) do win back trust when policies to prevent sexual abuseand other types like bullying- are put into practice and openly spoken about. Bystander behaviour is key to lasting change; we all need to take responsibility to make our community safer. We need to be open with our children that some people may try to take advantage of them and discuss approaches to stay safe. Individually we need to be on the alert for wrong behaviours and name them when we encounter them. The best solidarity for survivors is to change our society so others are not abused.

Yarragon Hall Happenings

As a committee we are very pleased that we have received another Baw Baw Shire Community Development Minor Works Grant for \$10,000. This will be put towards our project "Room Without A View". We are going to add a 7m x3.5m extension to our existing Storage Room, giving us ample storage and manoeuvrability of our existing 150 chairs and trestles when not needed (this has been an issue for many years) and also purchasing an extra 50 chairs (which has been asked of us several times but not having the space we were unable to facilitate). Many thanks to the Baw Baw Shire for their assistance in obtaining the grant. Our Hall itself is busy as usual with its regular bookings but we do have some vacancies. Our two rooms that are located behind the stage have now been renovated and climate controlled and are suitable for a smaller meeting or gathering. We also have the use of an art hanging system used for Art Shows.

From the October meeting of the Yarragon and District Community Association:

- A member from Baw Baw Shire Council will be present at the November Meeting to discuss all issues of drainage in Yarragon.
- Australia Day Celebrations are being planned with a breakfast at Market Street Park.
- The re-instatement of the bollards around the cenotaph is to go ahead, with the assistance of Baw Baw Shire Council. These have been in storage since the cenotaph was moved to its current location.
- The Yarragon 2030 planning is going ahead with a new sub-committee working with the Baw Baw Shire council to assess the next steps in the process.
- The Service Centre has taken the case to VCAT. The Council is defending its decision to oppose the application after receiving over 70 submissions opposing the development. The hearing date is March 4th, 2019.
- A new area for trucks to pull over to tighten their load before entering the highway is being investigated, now that Rollo Street is under reconstruction.
- Pick-My-Project for extending the fence along the edge of the highway in Waterloo Park was not successful due to lack of votes from the community.



Frank Harris Dineen was born on the 20th of May, 1896 in Yarragon, one of 5 children of John DINEEN and Emma ATKIN who were married in 1880, other children were John Stevenett b. 1881 died 1938 Launceston, Tasmania, Samuel Wilberforce b. 1883 died 1960 Queensland, William Charles b. 1886 died 1952 Warragul, and Eliza Emma b. 1887 died 1963 Maffra, the first 3 children were born at Waterloo (Now Yarragon) and the other two at Yarragon. John was one of the original settlers of Sunny Creek where they farmed. John and Emma are both buried in the Yarragon cemetery. Frank went to Sunny Creek State School. He served for 3 years in the Senior cadets and 3 years in the Citizen Forces (Infantry) with the rank of corporal. He started his working life with the Trafalgar Co-operative Butter and Cheese Factory and in 1911 he passed the exams for appointment as a telegraph messenger.

Frank enlisted on the 4th of August 1917 in Melbourne at the age of 21 years, 2 months, his description was given as 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighing 138 lbs, with a fair complexion, blue eyes, brown hair and religion Church of England and he had been working as a postal assistant, his mother Emma DINEEN was his next of kin (his father had died in 1914). His basic training was at Broadmeadows and from the 17th of September – the 24th of October he was at a Signal School with the rank of sapper, he was then sent to a Wireless Training School.

Frank embarked from Sydney on the 16th of November, 1917 aboard SS Canberra, he was at Moascar, Suez on the 21st of December. By the end of January 1918 he was in hospital with mumps, he was then stationed at Headquarters by February the 8th, and then July 16 he was at the 3rd Light Horse Brigade Headquarters. By the 25th of March 1919 he was at the AIF Headquarters in Egypt where he was promoted to Sergeant and later to a Temporary Staff Sergeant. He was "Brought to the notice of the Minister for meritorious service during period of demarcation abroad".

On the 29th of February 1920, Frank was discharged in Egypt on his request to take up civil employment in Egypt. He had been in service for 2 years, 209 days and abroad for 2 years, 104 days. He served for a short period as a war correspondent, before coming home and continuing as a postal assistant in Trafalgar. He conducted the Trafalgar newsagency for 7 years before resuming work with the Post Office, being the Post Master in Yarragon from 1948-1970. He lived at 40 Kitchener Street, Trafalgar.

On the 4th of May, 1929 he married Henrietta Rebecca GRAHAM, a teacher at Yarragon State School and they had 2 sons – John who was bank manager in Trafalgar and William (Bill) who is a bus proprietor (Warragul Bus Lines)

Frank was elected the President of the Trafalgar branch of the RSL.

He was the Electoral Officer for the subdivision of Yallourn and in 1928 was transferred to the Trafalgar subdivision. Frank was involved with many community committees, but in later years he was mainly involved in auditing duties for community groups

Henrietta died in 1972 and Frank died 23/12/1975 and they are buried in the Warragul cemetery

Property Fire Preparedness Window Narrows As Fire Season Looms

CFA has highlighted the need to prepare Victorian properties as the state faces an earlier, longer, and in some parts more severe fire season normal.

The fire danger period is fast approaching across Baw Baw shire, so any burn-offs need to be conducted soon and before the window to do so closes. It is expected that the fire danger period could be declared in the Baw Baw shire early in November., this means that no further burn-offs will be permitted without a permit.

"Victoria is experiencing low levels of rainfall and a build-up of fuel loads on the ground. These are conditions that could lead to a bad fire season

The best way to defend your homes is to prepare before the fire danger period begins. This includes cleaning up your gardens, your gutters and removing flammable waste from your yards.

Residents should have their property cleanups well under way and any piles of built fuel should be dealt within the next couple weeks.

Many rural property owners dispose of this waste with a burn-off, but consider alternative methods such as mulching, composting, chipping or taking green waste to a transfer station. Residents in the Yarragon town limits are not permitted to light bonfires, so these are the only method available to them.

Rural zone Residents who wish to conduct burn-offs on their private properties need to follow some basic rules.

"Check weather conditions, monitor the wind, and follow local council laws and regulations. Before lighting up, and register your burn-off on toll free 1800 668 511 or email

burnoffs@esta.vic.gov.au

It is important that as well as registering your burn-offs, you notify your neighbours that they may see smoke as their concerns may result in an emergency fire call to 000.

Baw Baw Shire can impose penalties for not registering your burn off, so a simple phone call can avert costly fines. Any illegal burn offs during the fire danger period will automatically invoke and police response and prosecution.

False alarms take CFA crews away from real emergencies, can increase the risk to the community and can be very frustrating for our crews, all of whom are volunteers and your neighbours. By registering your burn-off, any reports of smoke or fire will be cross-checked with the burn-off register to avoid unnecessary response of fire services.

When registering a burn-off by phone or email, people would be asked for basic information such as location, date, start and finish times, what they intend to burn and the size of the bonfire. The burn-off line is very easy to use – the operators are friendly, and prompt you by asking the key questions, this information will help fire crews get to your property if things do get out of control .

When conducting burn-offs, remain alert and always have resources on hand to extinguish the fire.

Check the weather, winds must be light and temperatures low. Make sure you have sufficient water on hand at all times and fully extinguish the burn once completed. Escaped burn-offs or those not conducted properly will result in you being liable for the consequences.

If you are concerned about your planned burn off, contact your local brigade for advice, help

and in some cases attend your ignition to monitor the burn in the early stages.

Keep your burn-off safe and legal:

- Check fire restrictions with your local council and register your burn on 1800 668 511
- Check and monitor weather conditions particularly wind
- To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand
- Leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn
- Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading
- Never leave a burn-off unattended stay for its entire duration
- If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately

Feasibility Study for Cycling in Baw

Baw Baw Shire Council has given the green light to investigate the possibility of providing residents with new cycling facilities that would meet the needs of a variety of different age groups and abilities.



The decision to proceed with a formal feasibility study was unanimously endorsed by Council at its 24 October Council Meeting.

The feasibility study will investigate the viability of two key projects:

Possibilities for cycling in the Logan Park precinct in Warragul, taking advantage of the current velodrome and the vacant adjoining land. Creation of an off-road trail from Nilma to Yarragon, in the vein of the existing Two-Town Trail between Drouin and Warragul.

These potential projects have been identified through the Economic Development Strategy 2018-2021.

Throughout the feasibility study process, there will be significant community consultation and engagement to ensure a well-rounded approach.

In addition to key project research, the feasibility study will provide strategic justification to support funding opportunities for any future cycling infrastructure projects that gain approval through this process. A consultant will be engaged to conduct the feasibility study with formal tender documents to be prepared and released in due course.
