GARDENING TIPS

As the weather is warming we now need to get our vegetable garden going for our summer fruit and veggies and look after our flower garden.

Most, if not all the soils in this region are acidic, so an application of lime (Calcium Carbonate) is recommended

to the garden at the rate of a good handful to the square metre. On the less clay soil I suggest you use dolomite, which is lime which contains Magnesium. On the heavy soils dolomite tends to make the soil even heavier. If your soil has a pH of around 6 to 6.5 you will not need to add lime, but if the soil is clay-like, the application of gypsum will help loosen up the soil. It is much cheaper to buy and is what liquid soil breakers and other products are based on.

Organic matter such as cow, sheep and horse manures are also good to dig into the garden, or apply to a no dig garden, but realise they are not fertiliser. They are like eating oat or wheat bran; they are bulk, but contain very little nutrients. Chook manure is a good base for organic fertiliser and is sold under many names including Dynamic Lifter etc. It has more nitrogen than potash, therefore is good by itself for leafy vegetables, but where you want fruit and/or flowers you need more potash (potassium) than nitrogen as a percentage. A good source of potash is the grey wood ash from your wood fires from over winter. If you have a wood heater keep store the ash in a dry place over winter. If you apply it in winter the potash leaches out with the rain and you have lost it. Poultry manure should not be used in potted plants as it can burn and kill them.

For vegetables where the fruit not the leaves are harvested, like tomatoes and capsicum, dig in your poultry manure before planting. Once your seedlings are established, when the plants are about 25 cm tall, apply half a handful of wood ash or a teaspoonful of potassium sulphate fertiliser around each plant. This will help produce more fruit.

Flowering plants such as roses are heavy feeders so I suggest an application of a handful of chook manure to a teaspoonful of potash be applied every couple of months from the end of August until the end of April. Annual flowering plants also respond well to potash fertiliser whether it is wood ash or potassium sulphate, but do not use potassium chloride, also sold as muriate of potash, as that is adding salt to the soil.

Watering is required over the warmer weather, but gardeners need to get this right. Deep watering is required. Surface watering does not encourage the roots to go down and makes the plants weak, and dependent on daily water in hot weather. Deep watering means that the water should penetrate down to a depth of at least 30cm, and not just at the surface. Mulching will reduce the amount of watering required and keep the surface cool, and the most efficient watering system is to use drip irrigation which waters over a period of hours but gets the water to soak in and not just run off.



Roses in an ornamental garden require very little water as they are actually native to dry arid regions of the world, from the Middle East through Turkey into western China. The best way to make them weak is to water too often, and this applies to all gardens. Roses only require a good deep watering once a month in the ground once established. Think of all the times you have seen them in old cemeteries and vacant and fallen down houses. Most people who live on tank water do not water all the time and yet have wonderful gardens

Over the next few months there will be opportunities to be involved in this year-long sculpture and mosaic project.

The next sculpture workshop on Tuesday, December 3, will involve cutting, bending and forming the light metal lathe

mesh to cover a polystyrene sculpture created in an earlier workshop. Participants will be using tin snips, and power drills to screw metal mesh to the polystyrene. This is followed by a workshop on Tuesday, January 21, where participants will be mixing and troweling render to form the first of many layers over the sculpture.

These free sculpture and mosaic workshops can be booked on line at https://bawbawartsalliance.org.au/cms/pat-the-dog Bookings are essential as places are limited.

While workshops enable people to be involved in hands on activities, the 'Station Gallery' at Yarragon is the place where visitors can see the work of many community members who belong to the Baw Baw Arts Alliance.

The November major exhibition at the 'Station Gallery', 'Masters and Apprentices of Print' was an outstanding success in terms of the beautifully eclectic range of work. It celebrated original, traditional and contemporary printmaking by print group members inspired by teacher, Alison Bain. The group was able to use a large printing press generously donated by Belinda Barnes in 2018.

This exhibition will be followed by a two month extravaganza called 'Octopuses Garden'. Members of the various art groups in the Baw Baw Arts Alliance have spent a year working towards this exhibition that promises to be as colourful and extravagant as the December/January exhibition last year, 'Enchanted Forest'. Expect vibrantly coloured crocheted seaweed and coral, a painted mermaid swimming from a shipwreck, a fabric mermaid with bright, wool hair, a large mosaic shell in bright blue glass pieces. The exhibition will be in the 'Station Gallery', Yarragon, from December, 2019 to January, 2020.

I don't know why I ever imagined that retirement would see me relaxing in a deck chair ... the sheep are out because the fence needs fixing, the cow is waiting to be milked, the weeds are growing but my tomatoes are not, and children need to be driven here and there ... cooking a Christmas feast is the last thing on my To Do list, and we prefer most of the time to eat food that doesn't make us feel lethargic afterwards.

However, there's an expectation amongst the younger members of our household that a certain amount of fuss will be made. At 9 and 6 years old they're becoming capable in the kitchen, so this will be their contribution to our Christmas table.

This recipe is simple to make, and it's a good use of those mega-sized strawberries you can buy these days.



The picture is selfexplanatory. The faces are made of whipped cream - I sweeten mine a little bit.

You'll need about a cup of whipped cream for 12 strawberries.

The eyes are made of chocolate sprinkles poked into the cream

You could get more creative with star-shaped cake decorations for buttons, stuck on with icing, but in our house we're going to keep it simple.



What do you want for Christmas? Kids are usually very quick to name a few things they would enjoy as presents. Sometimes, however, the best gifts for this age group are not things- toys or games that will be used for a while then discarded- but shared experiences. A trip to the beach or a special meal out certainly requires a bit more planning but will build our relationships, develop trust and lay down sustaining memories for the future. Fire Danger Period looms

The Fire Danger Period has not yet been invoked but it is expected to be declared in mid-December across the Baw Baw Shire municipality.

Yarragon Fire Brigade Captain, Ashley Smith, said: "Vegetation is drying out considerably with the warmer weather and early indicators are pointing to a long and challenging fire season ahead for all of us. It's still not too late to clean up your property if you haven't already done so, but the window for burning off is quickly closing. Residents can still burn off and they can also take up the green waste collection service offered by their local councils when preparing their properties through clearing, mowing or slashing."

When the Fire Danger Period is declared, all fires in the open air are banned without a permit, along with most activities with the potential to generate sparks. The Victorian Government and its agencies have declared that they will be taking a zero-tolerance approach to any fires resulting from people flouting the laws. Expect that any fires started will be fully investigated by police.

"While local CFA brigades do all they can to work with the community, we look to the residents to use common sense and take responsibility for preventing fires," Captain Ashley Smith said.

Residents can find information about what is and isn't permitted during the Fire Danger Period by visiting cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/can or by calling 1800 226 226.

During the Fire Danger Period (FDP) fires cannot be lit in the open air without a written permit from CFA or a Municipal Fire Prevention Officer. The FDP is based on local conditions and takes into account fuel moisture, fuel loads, grassland curing, weather and rainfall.

Fire Danger Period information

A written permit is required to burn off grass, undergrowth, weeds or other vegetation during the FDP. This permit may be issued by the Municipal Fire Prevention Officer or the CFA District Office. Please check with your municipality in the first instance.

Lighting a fire in the open without a permit is an offence and can bring a penalty of over \$17,000 and/or 12 months imprisonment. Barbeques and fires for cooking and warmth do not require a permit, but must be lit in properly constructed fireplaces (to view complete conditions visit cfa.vic.gov.au/can)

Use of incinerators, chainsaw/lawn mowers, welding/ grinding equipment and vehicles that come in contact with vegetation and machinery with an internal combustion/heat engine is permitted provided conditions are followed.

Farmers can find legal guidelines and practical advice at cfa.vic.gov.au/farming – important especially for new farmers, bush block owners or hobby farmers.

A <u>Total Fire Ban declaration</u> means no fires can be lit for the declared district for that day unless there is a specific exemption or special permit issued. This applies irrespective of the Fire Restriction status for a given municipality. Further details at <u>cfa.vic.gov.au/can</u>

As has been our custom in past years Yarragon Fire Brigade will be holding the annual Santa run in the Yarragon township on the 23th of December from 6pm.



The brigade will be assisting Santa in distributing lollies to the town's younger residents from the Yarragon's fire vehicles...so keep your eyes and ears open for the big red truck and that all familiar figure in red.

Yarragon Fire Brigade would like to take the opportunity to thank the residents for their support throughout the year, in both fund raising efforts and for their diligence on fire safety in the community.

It is great to be able to report that some of the hard won monies from fundraising have made their mark on Yarragon's fire station with the installation of the new automatic garage door and station signage. The new door allows remote open and closing from the vehicles saving us time and increasing security at the station. The signage has been designed to improve community engagement and recruitment, by showing the mix of members and the callout rate compared to last year so the community can assess their participation in our fire safety awareness and engagement campaign.

All local brigades need the ongoing active participation of residents during the coming fire season, so...




