WHAT BIRD IS THAT ALSO NOT IN MY GARDEN? By Margaret Young



Welcome Swallows are always welcome here at my place, but not when they nest in the carport right above my car!! I enjoyed their chattering and twittering as they flitted in and out of the carport feeding their young in the nest, catching insects on the wing or settling for the night on the rafters.

But, when I brought home my new (second hand) car, my tolerance waned. It was Winter so there were no fledglings or eggs in the nest and I was able to remove it with a clear conscience. I then filled in all the nesting spaces above the car with plastic webbing but left potential nesting spaces away from the car to rebuild in next Spring. But they decided it was no fun if you couldn't leave a mess on a car or shed windows and they haven't come back.

Welcome Swallows are also called Australian or House Swallows. They have a rufous-red throat and forehead and a forked tail like other swallow varieties. Their body is blue/black above and a dull white below. They can be found all over Australia except in the inland dryer areas and the North and heavily forested areas. They

love man made structures!! One of my bird books mentions under eaves, parapets, mine shafts and even on a boat or railway carriage can be a perfect nesting place!

Swallows will frequent margins of lakes, rivers or swamps perching on snags, dead branches or exposed roots ready to swoop low through clouds of insects. Being near water is also handy because their nest is built of mud pellets bound with grass and lined with feathers, fur, hair or grass.

The female lays 2-5 eggs ,whitish, streaked and spotted red-brown and lavender. If "my" swallows are anything go by, they will return each season to refurbish the nest or build more if family members join them. But they haven't come back to my carport, maybe they are down at the dam now.

One of my bird books says Welcome Swallows are partly migratory and have been self introduced to New Zealand!! Did they fly all that way, get blown across the Tasman or hitch a ride on a boat??

END OF AN ERA?

It appeared that this August 2023 edition of the Yarragon Community newsletter could have been its last - exactly 39 years since it started in August 1984. The newsletter started as a means to let the community know about all the activities an enthusiastic committee was planning for Yarragon to celebrate Victoria's 150th anniversary.

The newsletter was very humble in its presentation – just typed pages stapled together, no logo, no photos, but it was well received and became so much more than just informing and encouraging everyone to participate in the many and diverse events over the following 14 months of celebrations. It has continued to meet the needs of the community to inform and connect.

For 26 years the editor collated and wrote the newsletter by hand and then it was typed by volunteers who also printed, stapled and distributed the newsletter. For many, many years Pauline Wheller, Irene Rolfe, Bernie Green, June Hauxwell, Betty Elliot and Joan Trickey plus others generously gave their time.

The simple format continued until 2010 when a new editor, Tanya Stephens, with her computer skills updated it into a magazine format with interesting fonts, photos (albeit only in black and white), had it commercially printed and she also initiated a competition for a letterhead/logo. Of more recent times colour has been introduced.

In its 39 years it has only had 5 editors: 1984-85 Tini Cook; 1986-2009 Pam Morrison; 2010- 2012 Tanya Stephens; 2013- 2016 Jude Conway; and 2016- 2021 Jen Lowe; after which Jude took it on again with Jen helping at times.

Will it continue? Who will take on this role?

[At least for this year: Christina and Oscar]

Recently Faye Van Dyke, Beryl Weekly and I have been scanning all the newsletters so that they will all be available in digital form. There has never been systematic collecting of the newsletters, but thanks to several local collectors and hoarders we have



been able to source almost every edition. Next week we hope to complete this task – in total it amounts to some 4000 pages, then Faye with her technical skill will process it all so that people will only have to enter a name or word to find the pages for the article they seek. This will be invaluable for anyone researching town and local history and for genealogists too. It will be available at the West Gippsland Genealogy Society, the Trafalgar & District Historical Society and the West Gippsland Historical Society, Warragul.

During the scanning, it has been fascinating to note how the type of news, events and issues have evolved in Yarragon and to "Remember when"... "Wow, was THAT, that long ago?". It really is a valuable social history, perhaps not just limited to our town.

The newsletter has always been the work of volunteers, but of course there have been many other costs to meet and thanks to a generous bequest from Mrs Glad Badden, the regular advertisers and the donations slipped into the box from people as they pick up a copy, it has always been available for free.



Thanks to all who have written articles to keep us informed of the goings on in the community, the various clubs, groups, markets, etc. but especially to the editors Jude and Jen who have done such a wonderful job for the last 10 years. It is much appreciated.

ITHIUM-ION BATTERIES AND THERMAL RUNAWAY CFA By Tegan Brown, Secretary & Community Safety Officer



These batteries are becoming more and more common in our everyday lives. They are in mobile phones, tablets, power banks, laptop computers,

toys, appliances, power tools, e-bikes and e-scooters. Lithium-Ion batteries are rechargeable batteries. Just because they are common doesn't mean they are without risks.

What's the risk and why does it happen?

When these batteries short circuit, they release toxic and flammable gases which can lead to them catching fire. The reason why they short circuit and catch fire is due to a process called Thermal Runaway. Signs of Thermal Runaway are toxic, flammable smoke and vapours, flames and metal projectiles.

If a battery has full charge when this occurs, you may see sparks and jet-like flames which is an indicator of very violent and dangerous fire behaviour. I'm sure we have all seen videos of scooters and electric vehicles bursting into flames, this is a seriously dangerous issue!!

Thermal Runaway happens for a few reasons:

- The battery is being charged with an off label/ incorrect charging cable
- The battery may have been damaged by impact or is cracked/dented/punctured/crushed or has been exposed to overheating
- The battery may have been in fresh or salt water for a long time, causing corrosion

How can I reduce the risk of Thermal Runaway?

Reduce the risk of internal damage and overheating by only using chargers that have the correct power delivery (voltage and current). There are a few ways we can do this:

> By using batteries with their supplied charger or certified third party charging equipment

- Purchase batteries/devices/equipment from reputable manufacturers and suppliers
- Always follow manufacturer's instructions on charging and operation
- When the device/battery/equipment is fully charged, disconnect it
- Only use chargers that have the Regulatory Compliance Mark which indicates it meets Australian Standards

Don't let your device/battery/equipment overheat:

- Don't leave it charging on top of or stored near items that can easily catch fire such as a bed, soft material, couch, carpet, blankets or paper
- Never charge them under a pillow

Don't leave them unattended while charging and avoid charging them overnight while you are asleep.

Warning signs that Thermal Runaway may be about to occur:

- Strong odours
- Discolouration, blistering, bulging or swelling of casing
- Leaking
- Heating up and feeling extremely hot to touch
- Abnormal popping, hissing or crackling sounds
- Smoke and fumes

What to do if you think a Thermal Runaway Event is happening?

DON'T ever touch a swollen or ruptured battery/ device with bare hands, as the heat or chemicals can cause severe burns.

If a device is overheating:

- Unplug it and, if safe to do so, remove it to an outside area away from anything that can catch fire
- Leave the building and call 000
- If the device emits smoke or flames:
 - DO NOT TOUCH IT
 - Evacuate the area and close any doors to slow the spread of fire
 - Make sure NO ONE enters the building as the gases/smoke/fumes that the battery/device is emitting are highly toxic and flammable

YARRAGON PRIMARY SCHOOL SNIPPETS By Oscar Bijl

I interviewed four students and out of them one had won an art award – Saxon. I asked four students what high schools they were going to and the answers were: Warragul Regional – Saxon; Trafalgar High School – Ebony and Cooper; St Pauls - Arlo. The answers that I got after asking four people from my school what their favourite subject is varied. For Saxon it was writing, for Arlo and Cooper it was PE and for Ebony it was Maths and Science. My favourite subject is also Maths because of the fact that I get to be in a higher level with all my friends and get challenged. I was wondering how long people have spent at this school. Out of all my research, everybody that I asked were there for about 5 years, Saxon a little longer than the others. I've been there for only half the time of my schoolmates, 2.5 years. There was a theme regarding the students' favourite thing about Yarragon Primary: people. "Nice people and friends" - Saxon; "Staff are nice and rules are simple, but effective" - Ebony; "The teachers" – Arlo; "The people that are here" – Cooper. I agree.





I went on to ask some teachers some of the same questions and these were the answers. First I asked four teachers what their favourite subject was. They said, Maths for Bec, Art for Miss V and Writing for Anine. Sadly, Nicole didn't have an answer because she hasn't been teaching for long enough. She's only been here for 2 weeks compared to the other teachers that I asked. Bec was 2 years, Anine with 4 years as teacher's aide and Miss V with 3 years of teaching experience.

There was a similar theme regarding the teachers' favourite thing about Yarragon Primary: people. "The community feel" – Miss V; "All the kids" – Bec; "I love how the teachers try to get the best out of all the kids" – Nicole; "The people" – Anine. I asked why the teachers chose to teach at this specific school. This is what they said, and I quote: "I came here for a placement for a teaching degree and liked it so much, I decided to work here" – Nicole;

"Because it's close to where I live and I really like everyone here" – Bec; "Because I like working with kids" – Anine; "Because I have a Visual Arts major" – Miss V. As a nice note to end it off from, we learned from Miss V that at the end of the year she will take all of the art from every single grade and put it into a Digital Art Display for everybody to see.

Oscar is planning on interviewing different students and teachers each month and hopefully by next month we will have organised permission to include photos of them.











Given that Winter often keeps people inside, you may have missed the exhibition 'Pat and Friends' at the 'Station Gallery' in Yarragon. This quite eclectic exhibition of paintings, fibre, sculpture, jewellery and mosaics was typical of the wide range of quality artwork for sale by the 'Arts Alliance'. THOUGHTS FROM A LOCAL

Lately, the local newspaper has run articles and a few 'Readers' Letters' which have not been complimentary to Council, and I'd like to give my opinion.

For some reason it seems to be 'normal' to knock local Councils at every opportunity – even when one has little understanding of how Councils work, or even knowledge of their true responsibilities. For example, not every road in Baw Baw is the responsibility of the Council, parking at State Schools is not the responsibility of Council, and there are many other areas where the local Council simply has no say.

While advocating on Yarragon community matters over the past four or five years I have regularly been 'involved' with Baw Baw Council, and have found Councillors, and by far the majority of Council staff, totally motivated for the good of the general Community, efficient, and easy to deal with.

Nevertheless, recent events at Baw Baw Council Meetings concern me and, in line with comments made in the local press, divisions have appeared in the Council Chamber which are not helpful to the Community. These divisions appear to be more than just a 'healthy difference of opinion on specific matters', and I call on Councillors to work together to overcome any political or ideological differences.

Further, I believe it is not the role of local Councils to participate in 'social engineering' as has been demonstrated only too clearly by inner-city Melbourne councils. Waaayyyy back in time (the 80s!) there was an expression used which recommended well-managed companies 'stick to the knitting' – meaning in the case of Councils, "Roads, Rates and Rubbish". Some things should stay simple.

Volunteers at the West Gippsland Seedbank collect indigenous seed. The seed is cleaned, stored and sold for use in private and public revegetation projects.




