

WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN MY GARDEN?

A pair of Grey Fantails are busy building a nest on my back veranda.



They have chosen a thin branch/large stem of a big *Salvia* growing there, so I have to avoid walking along that part of the veranda. If I look like I am too

close they bob about on the clothes line furiously chastising me with high pitched tweets and twitters.

The nest is the size of deep eggcup or tiny wine glass with a tassel of fine grass hanging below. I am watching from inside the lounge room as they meticulously build the sides of the nest higher using their beaks to weave in strands of spider web to hold in place scraps of fine grasses, bark, wood fibre and leaves. I have just had my Angora goats shorn so they might use a bit of the scraps of fleece lying in the paddock as well.

Grey Fantail's other names are Cranky Fan, Mad Fan Snapper, White Fronted or White Shafted Fantail and they can be found all over Australia. Their bodies are mid grey above with their breasts shading from sooty to cream. They have white eye brows and ear marks as well as white tips on their tails. If their tail is not spread out in its usual fan shape, at rest it will be tilting up while the wing tips point downwards.

Fantails have a very active, erratic flight pattern as they catch insects on the wing. You will often see them flitting around grazing cows and horses in the field, as their movement disturbs insects, and they will follow you as you work around the garden often getting quite close.

As well as our gardens and farms Grey Fantails can be found in forests and woodlands. Their trilling calls often sound to me like the sound your fridge makes when you leave the door open! So keep an eye out for these active little birds in your garden right now.

Stop Press!

The latest on the pair on my veranda:

A couple of days ago there was one tiny egg in the nest but next day DISASTER! The fragile branch/twig the nest was on had snapped at the base and the tiny egg was smashed on the concrete, The nest was OK, so I propped it up as best I could with minimal interference. Surprise! Another egg was in the nest the next day! The nest is quite deep but tilting sideways a bit. I will let you know more next time.



Also, remember the story last October about a Thornbill who built her nest in my shed in a bag I keep my brush cutter things in? Well, she is back. I moved the bag to another spot, but she has found it and built another nest in it. She raised two lots of babies last time so I hope I don't need anything from that bag for a while.

TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE

Recently, Yarragon school friends from the 1950s, Florence Miles from Portland and Nellie Visser from Melbourne, had a lovely day catching up in Yarragon.

There was lots of talk, reminiscing, visiting their former homes, paying their respects to parents and siblings in the cemetery, cruising the streets and recalling who lived in each house back in the 50s & 60s.

That was how it was back then, everyone knew everyone in the town. Very few people had cars, and the town was very self-contained, providing all the shopping, social and sporting needs of the community and even employment – for the men (women were not allowed to work after marriage!). There was always something on at the hall (pre TV) and lots on offer for kids as well as adults.

However, the highlight of the day was visiting their former primary school teacher - Yarragon's much loved Marj

Williams. Of course, Florence and Nellie still thought of her as 'Miss Green'.

Lively reminiscences and laughter filled the room as Marj, at 92, and Florence and Nellie, at 77, are all still quick with the quips.

In the early 1970s, Florence travelled overseas, working as a nanny and spending much time in Portugal.

She returned to Australia in 1975, met and married a farmer near Portland and over the years they made three trips back to Portugal to see her former charges.

Nellie married and moved to Swan Hill in 1970 and later to Melbourne. She too has travelled widely with numerous trips back to the country of her birth, Holland, after migrating with her parents and siblings and coming to Yarragon in 1951.

The Miles family have had a long and continuous association with Yarragon. Florence came to spend a week with her bedridden sister Margaret Green (no relation to Marj) who, with her husband John, moved back to Yarragon six years ago to be near their son Steven and daughter Karen, who have lived in Yarragon for a long time.

For many who grew up in Yarragon, there is often the pull to return.



Florence Miles, who recently visited Yarragon, was named after her Aunt Florence Miles who is buried in the Yarragon Cemetery but whose portrait hangs in the Australian War Memorial in Canberra.

This famous painting is by Nora Heysen who was the daughter of artist Hans Heysen and the first official female war artist in Australia in 1943.

Heysen selected to paint Aircraftwoman Florence Ethel Miles, 21, as she saw her as a 'young, forward lass'. Having a driver's licence before the outbreak of war (rare in those days for women), she became a driver during the war, serving in Queensland.

THOUGHTS FROM A LOCAL

Three years ago - December 2020 - was a big month for the town of Yarragon. It was on 8th December 2020 that the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT) handed down its refusal to approve a massive fuel stop and restaurant proposed for the corner of Princes Highway and Hazeldean Road.



This was the second VCAT hearing on the matter, as some two years prior the applicant had originally proposed a McDonalds / KFC and Truck stop larger than the existing BP Officer.

Arguably, the Yarragon Community has never come together so quickly nor so strongly and the long-drawn-out fight started as a result of a Public Meeting in March 2018 until our victory in December 2020.

On each occasion, all nine Baw Baw Councillors were fully supportive of the Yarragon Community, as were Council's Planning Department who took the matter to VCAT and incurred significant legal costs on our behalf.

Locally, significant fund raising was necessary on both occasions, and thanks to an anonymous benefactor

picking up the costs for the second hearing, a small amount was left over for future Community use. The eventual VCAT decision stated "The proposal does not enjoy strategic support in this location. The (Planning) Scheme articulates the importance of coordinated and orderly planning for this township, including the development of infrastructure.... The scale and nature of the proposed use and development pre-empts this process and has the potential to undermine the directions of Yarragon expressed in the scheme".

It is believed the recent (November 2023) acceptance by Councillors of the *Yarragon Township Plan* further strengthens the 'Planning' aspect and hopefully this



matter is now closed.







MAYOR RE-ELECTED

Councillor Annemarie McCabe re-elected as Baw Baw Shire Mayor.

Baw Baw Shire Council has its first all-female leadership team since 2011, following the re-election of Cr Annemarie McCabe as Mayor alongside fellow West Ward Councillor Tricia Jones, who was elected as Deputy Mayor, at the Mayoral election on 14 November.

Cr McCabe said that she was looking forward to continuing to lead the Shire and advocate on behalf of its more than 60,000 residents.

"The Baw Baw Shire has seen some great outcomes over the past 12 months, and I look forward to working with the community to see what else we can do in the next year," Or McCabe said

"Advocacy and engagement are a growing priority for the Council, and the recent launch of Council's new online engagement platform Baw Baw Connect reinforces this."

Cr McCabe and Cr Jones will each serve a one-year term in their roles with the Victorian Council Elections to be held in October 2024.

Betty, a lively lady, came to Yarragon when she married and in the 50 years of living here was involved in EVERY-THING:


- Secretary of Dowton Park Ladies Auxiliary which played a big part in the fundraising and establishment of the football ground in the 1970s. She later wrote 'Dowton Park -The First Twenty Years'.
- Involved in the Athletics Championships held at Dowton Park.
- Secretary & Volunteer for 8 years at Headway, held in Yarragon's former Community House.
- Secretary of the Garden Club.
- Foundation member of Yarragon Primary School's 'Learning Assistance Program'; Tidy Towns; Neighbour-hood Watch & Yarragon Village Art & Craft Show.
- She helped with the Community Newsletter in the early years, the Community Quilt, Dairy Fests and The Big Beanie.
- Wrote booklet 'Lest We Forget' about the WW1 veterans named on our cenotaph.
- Helped plant the thousands of daffodils along highway (later removed by Baw Baw Shire) and also helped paint the old fences at the cemetery.
- Was involved in the Australia Day celebrations, the 'World Masters Bike Ride' around Yarragon.
- A member of Yarragon's 'Care Group' and 'C.W.A.'
- Involved in the fight for clean water for Yarragon and kept scrapbooks of the newspaper articles
- of the two year battle.

Took lots of photos of Yarragon's development over the years.

She had a wonderful way with words and wrote with wit and wisdom on many topics and compiled 'Recollections of Ferg' about Dr Ferguson, the only doctor servicing Yarragon, Trafalgar and District for some 45 years.

She managed all this whilst raising a family of four and running one of the Yarragon Milkbars in the 1970s. As Thelma Kingwill commented, it was only through the work of people in the community that things got done back then.

Betty was great company, participated in local concerts, loved scrabble, lunches, cuppas and chats around the table.



20 years ago Betty moved to Queensland to be closer to daughters and grandchildren and "to escape cold Gippsland" but still kept in touch with many here.

Thank you Betty for all you did for Yarragon.

Our sympathies go to her children and grandchildren.

As all Australians know, summertime = BBQ time.



Barbeques require ongoing maintenance as there is nothing like the lights and sirens of a fire truck to kill the barbeque party vibes.

Let's barbeque safely this summer by completing a few simple checks:

- Check the LP gas cylinder, if it hasn't been checked in over 10 years or is damaged – Go and get a new one.
- Check the hose to make sure it's intact and hasn't deteriorated over time If it's not intact, then get a new hose.
- Check the connections to make sure they are tight and that the O rings are in good condition and not cracked or split. – Any damage? Then replace with new ones.
- Check for gas leaks in the hose or connections with soapy water. If you have a gas leak you will see bubbles when you turn the gas on. If you see bubbles don't use your gas cylinder or hose until repaired or replaced.

Remove any excess fat from previous cooking to prevent fat fires.

General Barbeque Safety

- Never use them indoors or in a confined space as you will risk Carbon Monoxide poisoning.
- Cook with barbeque utensils and wear an apron to protect yourself from hot fat.
- Don't use barbeques in very windy weather as the burners may blow out, risking a gas leak.

Before you cook, do your BBQ checks and party safely.

Fire Danger Period (FDP)

As we are now in Summer, the FDP is rapidly approaching, the exact date is yet to be confirmed but likely to be this month. (A reminder that the FDP is not the same as a **Total Fire Ban**.)



Fire Danger Period (FDP)

CFA declares the Fire Danger Periods by municipality during periods of increased fire risk.

During the FDP any landowner wanting to burn fuel (light or heavy) will require a permit from CFA. We strongly encourage you to avoid this unless absolutely necessary. A reminder that outside of the FDP you are still required to register your burn off with ESTA and need to comply with the Baw Baw Shire council burn off conditions.

Progress is going well towards our 30 November targets for securing funding from Sport and Recreation Victoria, that Baw Baw Shire must apply for on our behalf, for an artificial green.

We have three key short-term targets to be met by 30 November: \$100k in our funding contribution (last reported at \$87k) - now reached ahead of time; increasing membership to a total of 60 members (40 at the start of October) - now stands at 71 members on the 22 November; preparing a winning submission – first draft is expected anytime with final submission due 13 December. We look like we are in good shape on those factors over which we have control.

How we are going on the competition green? Saturday Pennant Div4 have played 5 rounds with 2 wins and 3 losses to hold 5th position on the ladder of 8 teams. Saturday Pennant Div6, a team shared with Thorpdale, have also played 5 rounds with 2 wins and 3 losses and sit 10th on the ladder of 12 teams. Tuesday Pennant Div3 have played 5 rounds with 2 wins and 3 losses to hold 6th position on the ladder of 10 teams.

Our Twilight Barefoot Bowls program runs on the 1st and 3rd Thursdays of each month during daylight savings. For our offering of 16thNovember we were at or near our capacity with 65 patrons. Future offerings are on the 7th December and 18th January 2024.

We have a member only Christmas function on 15th December with external catering and a capacity of 55. For those wishing to attend please notify the Club by no later than the Tuesday prior to the Thursday event they wish to attend. Only the first 70 patrons can be accommodated. Cost is \$15 per adult and \$10 per child.

Do your eyes glaze over when you hear words like sustainability or town planning? What's in it for you? Well actually, a great deal. We all would like to think that we will leave behind a legacy for our children or future generations. Putting it simply, sustainability is about meeting the needs of current generations without compromising the needs of future generations, while ensuring a balance between economic growth, environmental care and social well-being. We have to

When planning is successful, it can provide protection for the environment, promote and facilitate regeneration, help create and sustain communities, and create new and exciting places by ensuring land uses are appropriately located and that:

- · buildings and land uses do not conflict with each other
- the character of an area is not detrimentally affected
- development will not detrimentally affect the environment
- through sustainable practices future generations are considered in decision making
- places of heritage significance are not detrimentally altered or demolished
- sustainable practices improve our lives, protect our eco system.

If you live, work, learn, play or run a business in Baw Baw Shire you should be interested in planning because everyday decisions are being made at the local lot level, neighbourhood, town and right up the regional level which can impact on your ability to enjoy this great place.



Have you ever interacted with Baw Baw Shire Council on a planning matter whether as an applicant for a permit, an affected adjoining neighbour, a user of an open space or at a community forum or council meeting? What was that experience like for you? Was it positive, where you felt your voice was heard or was it not so positive?

Because the Shire and its elected officials and staff are responsible for the delivery of projects and services worth many hundreds of millions of dollars, your money, it's important to take more than a passing interest in local civic matters. 


