# **FUTURE YARRAGON NEEDS US NOW!**

Forty years ago, in 1983, our nowthriving tourist strip was just an idea in a business-family's head, our new school was a paddock full of hope, and our railway station was an eyesore.

Even 20 years ago, Yarragon was very different to how it is now. The improvements we enjoy are the results of a great deal of foresight and hard work by a few locals, who had to be determined and persistent 'squeaky wheels' to get the attention of governments.

The school has around 100 more enrolments than it had in 2012 when it moved to the Loch St site, and whilst the students then were excited at having over double the playground space, that space has been reduced by a rising school population and the portables brought in to accommodate them.

With over 300 new housing lots soon becoming available, what not so long ago seemed like plenty of space for our school, will soon be not enough.

What else will soon not be enough? Is there enough space for commercial developments to serve a larger population, whilst still meeting the needs of visitors?

Will our traffic management be adequate for the increased number of residents trying to enter and leave the town?

Will zoning allow for more business and industrial development, which will bring more opportunities for local employment, or will businesses have to set up elsewhere to get the space they need?

Will the sporting facilities we have now be adequate in 20 years?

Baw Baw Shire Council engaged consultants, SMEC International, to help them develop a Township Plan for Yarragon, to see us through the next 20 years.

Many of you have taken the opportunity to engage in this process, which has been going for more than 12 months, and a proposal was released for public comment in November 2022. The deadline for comments has been extended to February 19th 2023, so if you haven't recorded your thoughts on the consultants' conclusions yet, you still have time.

And if you haven't read it yet, it's worth a look.

It records Yarragon's wishes around the extent and type of development allowed, and will be used by developers and businesses to guide their investments in our town. It details zones for future housing and business, recreation and education ... oh no, hang on, there is no provision in the current proposal for a larger education precinct, and the consultants thought future light industrial businesses could go to Trafalgar, and there's nowhere for a bigger fire station yet, and a sports stadium would make sense at Dowton Park, but is there room?

Are we ok with that?

The consultants determined, based on past growth figures, that we can



expect an average growth of 35 dwellings a year, or 735 in 20 years time. According to that calculation, that would not give us the 5,000 residents needed to justify a full-size supermarket, so we don't need to think of making provisions for that before 2040.

Did they get that right? The 76 lots in Rodier Rd filled up pretty quickly.

Would it be better if some of the proposed residential land west of Hazeldean Rd was reserved for future education and sporting use?

This new Township Plan will be Yarragon's development guide book for the next 20 years, which means that if it's not quite right, we'll have to live with the consequences for 20 years.

Members of YDCA, mindful that there might be issues they've missed, or given too much weight to, are interested to hear the views of more Yarragon residents than the ones who usually come to YDCA meetings. To that end, they are hosting a community meeting at St David's Uniting Church Hall on Tuesday 7th February at 7pm.

YDCA believes we will get further in improving outcomes from the Township Plan process if we speak with one voice.

# LIVING SAFELY THROUGH THE FIRE DANGER PERIOD Written by Tegan Brown

### RECORD NUMBER OF CALLOUTS

Last year we had a record 139 call outs that our members attended; this was the largest number of annual incidents to date. It is a sign of the expanding local area and continued need for active volunteers to support the community.

# WHAT WE'D LIKE YOU TO KNOW ABOUT THE FIRE DANGER PERIOD

The CFA declared the start of the Fire Danger Period (FDP) in West and South Gippsland on the 16<sup>th</sup> January.

### WHEN IT STARTS

The FDP is a period of time where the CFA restricts the use of fire within the community to reduce the risk of a bushfire starting. The FDP can start as early as October and finish as late as May the following year.

When the FDP starts in any municipality it is all dependent on the amount of rain in the area, how fast the grass is drying off, and other local conditions.

### FDP RESTRICTIONS ON DOMESTIC ACTIVITIES

During the FDP to have a barbeque or light a fire for warmth, operate a cooker, hot plate or barbeque for catering purposes, or use a spit style rotisserie heated by heat beads, wood or solid fuel, the following restrictions are in place;

- the wind MUST be less than 10km/hr,
- the fire is lit in a properly-constructed fireplace or in a trench at least 30 centimetres deep.
- there is a 3 metre area clear of flammable material around the fire,
- an adult is in attendance at all times,
- there is water on hand to extinguish the fire and a person is present until the fire is completely extinguished.

### FDP RESTRICTIONS ON BURNING OFF

You CANNOT Burn off unless you have a Fire Danger Period permit issued by CFA, FRV or a Municipal Fire Prevention Officer. You will need to follow all instructions associated with that permit, and as with any fire, there must be a person present with sufficient water to extinguish the fire, who remains until it is completely extinguished.

### FDP RESTRICTIONS ON RURAL ACTIVITIES

When driving vehicles that will come into contact with crops, stubble, weeds or other vegetations, the vehicle must be fitted with an

efficient silencing device (eg. muffler) that takes all of the exhaust from the engine through the silencing device. You should avoid driving vehicles through vegetation/crops on hot and dry days, to reduce the risk of starting a fire as much as possible.

# <u>FDP RESTRICTIONS ON CHAINSAWS AND LAWNMOWERS</u>

When using a chainsaw or lawnmower in dry (not green) vegetation, it must be free from faults and mechanical defects that could cause an outbreak of fire, fitted with an efficient spark arrester, and have an area of at least 3 metres around the machine cleared of flammable material. You must also carry at least 9 Litres of water in a spray pump pack or pressured fire extinguisher, to extinguish any fires that may start.

### TRAVELLING DURING THE FDP

On any day during the FDP you can find further information on the CFA website about the specific restrictions in place and the Fire Danger Ratings for each day. It is always good to plan ahead when travelling, and know the risks you may face in that area.

### **TOTAL FIRE BAN DAYS**

These are days where the fire risk is deemed heightened and if a fire were to start it would spread rapidly and be difficult to control. On these days you CANNOT have a solid fuel fire, use a wildlife scare gun, burn off, use an incinerator, do any welding/hot work or beekeeping. Avoid using farm machinery, driving over dry vegetation or crops, using chainsaws or doing any mowing unless absolutely essential.

As always be fire smart by being aware, educated and prepared!


# WHAT BIRD IS THAT SCREECHING IN MY GARDEN By Margaret Young


For me, one of the sounds of summer is the squeaky-gate sound of young Yellow Tailed Black Cockatoos waiting for their parents to return to the nest - or maybe it is too hot for them to be bothered flying off themselves in search of food.

Meanwhile, their parents are in the cypress trees along my track, screeching even louder and rustier whilst ripping pine cones apart to get the seeds within.

It is a summer ritual for these cockatoos. You have to be careful when walking up the track not to be donged on the head by a dropped pine cone, or trip on the shredded litter on the ground. They also use their strong beaks and claws to prise bark off the blackwood trees in the back paddock to find grubs and borers.



Both sexes are mostly black and have distinctive yellow bars on their tails that are very visible in flight. Males also have yellow cheek patches.



They build their nests on decayed debris-filled hollows in tall trees in temperate rainforests, alpine woodlands, eucalyptus forests and woodlands, coastal areas, and plantations. So it is important that we maintain our forests and large established tree for these magnificent birds, and many other parrots and cockatoos, to make a home.

When the Yellow Tailed Black Cockatoos have finished feasting the cypress trees they will move off to seek food sources in other places, returning to us next summer. What is your special bird sound of summer?

### COUNCIL REMAINS ACTIVE IN YARRAGON

As expected, over the Holiday Season things quietened down on the Council front, nevertheless

- 1) Following the Planning Panel Hearing on the sub-division proposed for Yarragon Leongatha Road (C145 Amendment), the Panel's Report is expected to be given to Council any day now. Upon receipt, Council has 10 days in which to make the report public.
- 2) Planning continues on the former school site in Rollo Street. Geo-tech investigative work and site contamination tests has been completed with the results awaited, together with an Arborist's report. The necessary Land Survey has been completed and once that report is received, it will allow Council to seek Fee Requests from potential Main Contractors.
- 3) The planned footpath along the Northern side of Rodier Road from Loch Street to Summers Road is in the final planning stage, and work is scheduled to commence mid-late February, subject to weather and contractor availability.
- 4) Despite the departure of the Council Officer previously involved, planning of the re-construction of Loch Street between the school and Ti-Tree Reserve continues, with consideration being given to allowing for improved parking between the school and Rodier Road.
- 5) Regrettably, further vandalism has been reported in Yarragon, with graffiti appearing on the skatepark ramps. There must be Yarragon residents who are aware of whoever is responsible please speak up!

### SCHOOL IMPROVEMENTS

Parents attending the end-of-term School Concert noticed a huge improvement in the stage area.

### TALKING ABOUT THE WEATHER; how 2km makes a difference!

Jim, in Rodier Rd, has consistently recorded his rainfall, and his totals are always less than our correspondent, Jen. In the six years from 2017 to 2022, his total was 5,734mm, compared to Jen's 6,327mm, a difference of 593mm.

I'm guessing the siting of the rain gauge could be a factor:


The Bureau of Meteorology states: *The distance of the gauge from buildings, trees or other objects should be* **at least** 


twice the height of the obstruction, and preferably four times the height. For instance, the gauge should be more than 10 metres from a house 5 metres high and more than 30 metres from the nearest branches of a tree 15 metres high.

But I suspect that even if Jen and Jim both had the perfect position, their totals would be different. Many times on our hill we have watched with envy (or relief, depending on the season) when the rain is falling elsewhere. Jim is right; 2km does make a difference.

I'd be willing to bet, though, that June 2022 was the wettest June in that 6-year period for all of us, and February 2022 was the driest.

I wonder what this year will bring?
