WHAT BIRD IS THAT ON MY LAWN?

I call them Fire Tails, but they are officially Diamond Fire Tails.

They are described as being a robust little bird with a pale grey head and a pale brownish back.

Males have a red beak, a black chest band and white spotted flanks. Females' breast bands and spots are paler. They both have distinctive red and black tails.

I usually see them on my front lawn at the same time the blue wrens are visiting, but they have only just appeared in the back yard where the gravel area is becoming mostly grass now the wet weather has arrived.

I think they preferred the front garden when there were clumps of nandina bamboo that provided shelter and a refuge from predators, but the bush rats chewed through their roots and killed them. I have planted bushy native shrubs as replacements, but they have a bit more growing to do.

These Fire Tails hop about energetically as they feed on the ground and lawns looking for seeds and insects.

If they are disturbed they take off to the nearest tree or shrub with an erratic bouncy flight while emitting high pitched squeaks.

They live in open eucalyptus forests Face book: and woodlands, grass lands, acacia scrubs, orchards, golf courses, parks and gardens. They build a bulky, well constructed, bottle-shaped nest with an entrance spout about 150mm long, in dense scrub or trees, or higher



up in mistletoe clumps, and even under the platform of a Hawks nest! It is lined with fine grasses, feathers and down.

The female will lay 4-6 white eggs and maybe up to 9!

These Fire Tails can be found inland along the Eastern coast from Queensland right round to South Australia. So watch out for these energetic little birds in your garden.

PS Have you heard of "Friends of Drouin Trees"? As well as publishing small books about Drouin trees, they have published a couple of books about local birds, which are handy for identifying unfamiliar birds that catch your eye. Recently they have added one about Flora, Fauna and Fungi found in our area.


No business would be able to progress without the support of good staff. Over the time I have had great people and good experiences that has made my time very rewarding.

ISSUES TO CONSIDER WHEN

STORMWATER DRAINAGE

Following information gathered during the recent Planning Panel hearing on the proposed Waterloo 3823 development on either side of Yarragon-Leongatha Rd, doubts were raised in regard to Yarragon's entire stormwater drainage capacity.

The dispersal of stormwater from Yarragon township depends on a very limited number of crossing points under the railway line and highway, and this has been the case for many years.

A council report from 2013 included 12 major recommendations needed to cope with the increased stormwater requirement expected to result from opening new housing developments, but as far as can be easily established, only one of those recommendations has been carried out to date—the retarding basin between Rollo Street and Yarragon-Leongatha Road.

It is estimated that since that 2013 report, approximately 220 houses and a new primary school have been built.

It is not simply the additional residences which cause increased stormwater volume and flow rate, but the amount of impervious material; roofs, driveways, road surfaces, footpaths, school playgrounds, tidy lawn vs rough paddocks, etc, which cause an increased and faster runoff versus a paddock simply soaking up rainwater and/or flooding. In technical terms, the coefficient used to calculate drainage requirements in an area (fraction impervious) varies from 10% for open paddock up to 60% for developed land, meaning, in layman terms, the stormwater drainage requirement for developed land is at least 6

times that of open paddock (where flooding is normally less damaging anyway.)

In Yarragon's case, this additional drainage requirement was added to an already flood-prone area severely criticised in the 2013 report as being inadequate.

A budget submission has been made requesting - Short term budget/LTIP [Long term Infrastructure Plan] requirements ASAP

- Immediate inspection and urgent rectification of blocked open drains on the northern side of the railway line as far as Moe River/contour drain.
- A review of the 2013 recommendations and a plan to complete within a reasonable timeframe.
- Plan and design improved drainage plans and consider what can be done in conjunction with the timing of new works by the Waterloo 3823 developer.

Medium-term requirements (1-5 years)

• Council to re-run flood modelling with updated information to establish current standing. It is sincerely hoped that such modelling will produce a less dramatic image than that attached to the 2013 report. That image showed the outcome of inaction on the 2013 mitigation recommendations, town expansion including Waterloo 3823 and the Potential Residential Area alongside Hazeldean Rd, in 'probable maximum flood' conditions. It indicated possible inundation to a depth of 500+mm across approximately 40% of the township, including the main tourist strip!

WE LIVE ON A FLOOD PLAIN

- Commence planning and design of western end Potential Residential Area, ensuring council's strategic planners consider the 2013 recommendations to apply appropriate "special building overlays across the catchment to manage future development and to reduce the flood risk for new buildings." (quote from 2013 report)
- Consider installing larger-sized and/or additional culverts under highway and railway line.
- In conjunction with relevant third parties—VicTrack, RRV [regional Roads Victoria], WGCMA [West Gippsland Catchment Management Authority] ensure stormwater drainage is sufficient to Moe River and/or Contour Drain

Long-term requirements (5+ years)

 Plan what stormwater drainage requirements will be needed as Yarragon's residential area expands further—towards the south as far as McIntyre's Rd, east to Gordon Rd, west to Robert's Rd. Similarly, proposed increased industrial offerings on the northern side of the highway will require additional, more complex, drainage.

We note with interest the LTIP suggestion for a shire-wide Drainage Strategy under consideration for 2026/2027, but firmly believe Yarragon cannot safely wait until then.

YARRAGON PARKING REPORT

At the Council Meeting on May 24, councillors unanimously accepted the Yarragon CBD Parking Study compiled in March 2023. The main

recommendations were:

- Increased parking enforcement, as well as develop new initiatives and community education to ensure best parking practices.
- Convert unrestricted parking spaces on Princes Highway service road to time-restricted spaces.
- Convert 4 unrestricted parking spaces on Loch Street to long vehicle parking spaces:
- Convert unrestricted parking spaces in Loch Street carpark and Hann's Lane northwest carpark to 2 hour parking.
- Reconstruction of Campbell St and keep all on street parking to 1 hour
- Construction of angle parking on the south side of Hann's Lane near Rollo St
- Rectify all signage deficiencies
- Improve parking wayfinding signage

It should be noted that East Ward Councillors shared our concern at the recommendation to "increase parking enforcement".

The major improvement will be the eventual introduction of a number of new parking spaces as part of the former school site works, but other than that, additional new spaces within our CBD are impractical.

It has already been established that converting parallel parking to angle parking on the northern side of the Princes Highway service road between Campbell Street and Rollo Street would entail major works, and cost in the region of \$50,000 per parking spot, and the only other remaining option within the CBD would be to asphalt the skate park!

All residents experience frustration at being unable to park easily during certain periods on certain days, but the reality is that few of us—and certainly very few tourists, would be willing to park on the northern side of the highway, so attempting to have VicTrack improve their area to allow reasonable parking would be futile at this stage.

The Baw Baw Arts Alliance is a not for profit collective of artists who not only display their work in the 'Station Gallery', Yarragon and frequently work together, but make it possible for the Alliance to support other Arts related organisations such as the Warragul Camera Club.

Anita George, president of the Alliance, recently presented Pam Rixon of Doncaster, with the Baw Baw Arts Alliance sponsored award. The award was for winner of the 'Open Monochrome Prints' section of the 50th Anniversary of the Warragul National Photographic Exhibition held at the West Gippsland Arts Centre. [See photo, above]

Coming up in June is an exhibition of Wendy Twyerould's detailed Australian Landscapes hanging in the main gallery space at 'The Station Gallery', Yarragon.

In her exhibition titled 'Shades of Green', Wendy takes her artist's eye to focus on miniscule aspects of land and seascapes, from delicate fern fronds to gently floating lilies, from shaggy eucalyptus bark to Knife-like icebergs. All these are executed in richly textured oil paints.

In the section of the gallery called 'The Wall' Heather Easdown is displaying her intricately woven

macrame hangings.

While many might remember the macrame work of the seventies when people scoured beaches for driftwood, Heather takes inspiration from the Australian bush, searching for a particular branch, which she then cleans and sands to suit an original design.

Take time to enjoy all that the 'Station Gallery Shop' has to offer alongside all exhibitions; for example, the range of individually crafted wooden boxes by Bruce Wearne provides a balance to larger works of art hanging on the walls.

MAKING PROGRESS

This month the focus has been on opportunities in Yarragon.

Baw Baw Shire Council is about to undertake drain maintenance to reduce the incidence and severity of potential flooding in Yarragon. A budget submission has been made for further drainage works. This is considered a good start to the drainage matters raised during the Independent Panel hearings on Amendment C145 (proposed development to the east of Rollo Street), but this needs not to be the end of the matter.

Council has been questioned about the decision to reject Amendment C144 covering inundation overlays. This has left a significant vacuum in this space and has potentially significant ramifications for developments approved until new overlays can be prepared and put in place.

The officer controlling the Rollo Park development (former School site) is due to return from leave in mid-May and we hope to see the project advance with detailed plans being developed followed by more work.

YDCA Members who have utilised the "meet the Mayor on Monday's" reported having received a very good hearing from Mayor, Annemarie McCabe. This is a great initiative for concerned citizens to utilise and the Mayor is to be congratulated on the initiative and her commitment on following through.

Repairs to the walking track between Leongatha Road and Loch Street have been underway with clearing of access and recently a delivery of the wrong sand (washed sand) for the resurfacing. This mistake was picked up by the project officer and a number of members of the community who reported it BBSC. To the credit of the project officer he moved very quickly to get the matter rectified and was very diligent in keeping those people who reported the error up to date on rectification steps.

As reported over the last 2 editions of the Yarragon Newsletter, there is good and useful future work for the YDCA to undertake, but we need 1 or 2 people to take on executive roles to remain open for business beyond July. If you are community minded and looking to assist your local community to move forward in a positive manner then please consider coming to our next meeting and speaking with our current President, Peter Kingwill, Secretary, Richard Polmear or Treasurer, Jen Lowe.

The next meeting of the YDCA will be held at the Fire Brigade building, Murray St, Yarragon on Tuesday 20 June 2023 commencing at 7pm. Our AGM will be held 18 July.

SMOKE ALARMS ACTUALLY SAVE LIVES

I'm sure you've seen all the CFA TV adverts, signage and brochures on smoke alarms and thought are they really that important? The answer is an unambiguous YES!

Most fatal fires happen while we are sleeping between 8pm and 8am, and 60% of those start in the bedroom or living areas. When we are asleep we lose the ability to smell, so we cannot smell the smoke from a fire and our bodies cannot alert us to wake up and escape the house. That is where smoke alarms come in.

Smoke alarms are your electronic nose.

There are two types of Smoke Alarms;

- Photoelectric which mainly detect visible smoke including large particles present in smouldering type fires.
- Ionisation which mainly detect the presence of extremely small particles of smoke. These particles are usually present in fast-flaming fires.

There are also Dual sensor alarms which have the combined features of both smoke alarms. These will typically perform more consistently across a range of fire conditions.

Where should Smoke Alarms be installed?

- Outside all bedrooms/sleeping areas
- On each storey in a multi-storey home, located in the path that people will use to evacuate
- Ideally inside every bedroom as well (optional)
- NOT in the bathroom or kitchen

What are the benefits of Interconnected Alarms?

It means that when any alarm is activated then all alarms will sound. This is especially useful for larger homes, two storey homes, homes with young children, elderly, deaf/hearing impaired persons or persons with a disability, as other persons in the home can be alerted to assist them

out of the house in a timely manner.

There are specialised smoke alarms for deaf/hearing impaired persons that are linked to a strobe light and a vibrating pad placed on the bed.

What can I do if my smoke alarm operates every time I make toast or have a shower?

Do not remove the battery. A primary reason why smoke alarms do not operate when needed is because batteries have been removed after repeated false alarms. What you should do is:

- Check the type of smoke alarm installed if it is an ionisation type, consider replacing it with a photoelectric type smoke alarm.
- Consider installing an exhaust fan in the kitchen or bathroom.
- Consider relocating the smoke alarm away from the kitchen or bathroom.

If my Smoke Alarm is connected to mains power why does it also need a battery?

This is back up. When you have a power outage the smoke alarm will run off the battery.

Keep your smoke alarms in working order like any other appliance in your house. Follow these three very simple steps:

- Test it monthly
- Clean it annually and replace the battery if it is a 9 volt

replaceable. Newer models have 10 year Life long lithium batteries that don't require replacing

Replace the whole unit every 10 years

Smoke alarms save lives so keep it simple. Make sure your smoke alarms are working.


