YARRAGON REPRESENTED AT WAR MEMORIAL (ACT)

Debbie was invited by Roy Robinson to the recent Yarragon Lions Club meeting at St. Jarlath's Hall. He shared his experience of travelling to Canberra to attend the ANZAC Day Dawn Service at the National War Memorial. More than 15000 people attended at first light for the moving ceremony. The crowd was addressed by Vice Admiral David Johnston, AC Vice Chief of the Defence Force.

"Eight decades ago, with the world at war, two young Australians served as far from home as you can imagine, at the top of the northern hemisphere, in Norway. Jack Breed was from Perth in Western Australia and Hugh Kilday was from Yarragon in Victoria.

Both were fly. They served with No. 196

Squadron, part of the Royal Air Force's Transport Command. They took part in major airborne operations and flew clandestine missions supporting resistance movements in Europe. Seventy-nine years ago, on a mission to disarm German troops, Flight Lieutenant Jack Breed and his entire crew,

including Warrant Officer Hugh Kilday and 14 British paratroopers, were killed when their bomber crashed outside Oslo. They died just two days after the War in Europe came to an end. Some years ago, I walked through the snow and laid a wreath at the graves of these two young men."

At the Lion's dinner, Debbie met born to Bill Kilday, nephew of Hugh Kilday. Kathryn Kilday Holdsworth, Hugh's niece, sent through the picture of her uncle to the left. She noted that family members have also travelled to Norway twice and hope to return next year for the 80th anniversary of their uncle's tragic death.



The National War Memorial also commemorates another Yarragon resident: Emma Conway. In 2001-2002 in Afghanistan, she was known as Able Seaman Conway and served on board HMAS Kanimbla. The purple bandana she wore, along with her

overalls, are in the War Memorial collection. A mannequin of her has just been created and these items will be on display in 2026.

'Stoker Emma Conway: the engine room, HMAS Kanimbla' by official Australian War Artist Peter Churcher painted in the engine room in 2002 is also in the collection.

WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN MY GARDEN?

OR: WHAT I SEE ON MY WALKS

Galahs! They
haven't actually
popped into my
garden for a chat,
and didn't ever
come to my place
up the hill, though
I did see plenty of
them a short way
down the road.



My enduring memory of galahs is from driving through towns in grain growing areas, where flocks would be on the road outside grain silos busily pecking up all the spilt grain. They would fly off in great grey and pink squawking clouds when the next truck arrived to deliver its load.



Galahs are also called Pink and Grey Cockatoo or Rose-Breasted Cockatoo. [Ed's note: my husband calls them Pink Chickens] They have a silver grey back, pale grey rump, light pink face and breast and a small pink crest that they can fluff up when excited. They are about 35 cm in size, so easy to spot.

Galahs can be found all over Australia except very arid areas though European settlement has allowed them to extend their range as land is cleared for grain crops and permanent watering places are established for stock. Have you seen a flock of thirsty galahs lined up around the sides of a water trough or dam? A gorgeous sight.

They still need big trees with cavities for nesting. Unusually, they line the cavity with fresh green leaves then the female lays 2-5 round white eggs. The chicks stay in the nest for about 49 days, a very long time compared to tiny birds.

Galahs can live up to 40 years and some have been known to get to 70 if the conditions are right, possibly as a pet or in a zoo. Flocks range from 10-1000 individuals (higher end = unhappy grain farmers). In fact, Galah populations are not diminishing due to human activity, but increasing!

Galahs make great pets, when purchased from a registered wild life supplier! A young neighbour of mine a long time ago had Ned the Galah who happily sat on the boy's shoulder as he road his unicycle round the block. Ned also liked apple seeds, but not the black outer coating which he would deftly peel off using his tongue and the pointy end of his beak — a wondrous feat to watch.

So enjoy those big pink and grey clouds when you see them, though I think they might be moving to warmer places than Yarragon at the moment!

TRAFALGAR RETARDING BASIN NEARS COMPLETION.

Stage one of the Trafalgar Retarding Basin will be complete soon with excavation and embankment work to be finished in July.

Council received \$500,000 in funding through the State Government's Risk and Resilience Grants Program to build a retarding basin on the west of Trafalgar, reducing flood risk for 220 properties. Council has contributed close to \$1.3 million to the project.

This project, which totals nearly \$2 million, is a key part of Baw Baw Shire Council's Trafalgar Flood Modelling and Drainage Strategy and works are being carried out by The Range Trafalgar Pty Ltd. The Risk and Resilience Grants Program co-funds initiatives that are focused on identifying and mitigating potential natural disaster risks, such as climate change adaptation, designing resilient infrastructure and developing strategies to manage the local and regional risks of natural disasters.

Stage two, which includes competition of the wetland, will be finished once all sub-divisions have been complete.

Andy Tegart said "We actually turned 45 in December last year but due to a level of activity with fire, flood and storm emergencies we had to put our celebration plans on hold. Now we're able to go ahead with a birthday function to recognise the journey and contribution of **GERF** members supporters for the last 45 years and the future of GERF in 2024 and beyond"

GERF was set up in 1978 as a result of a fire in Australian Paper plantations which impacted on local residents in the East Gippsland region. The manager at the time felt obligated to make arrangements to provide emergency financial assistance to those families. And so the GERF concept was born.

LET'S COOK UP SOME COMPOST!

How's your compost pile shaping up? Is it a hotbed for healthy bacteria, or is it looking a little lifeless? Life gets hectic, and sometimes our compost can bear the brunt of our busy schedules, turning into a gloomy, gooey heap. But fear not! Here are some top tips to revive your compost and prep it for spring planting:

Got a slimy, smelly mess?

Time to bring in the browns! Dead leaves, dried grass, hay, untreated sawdust, shredded paper or cardboard - these are all rich in carbon and give your compost bacteria the energy they need to thrive. Keep some handy near your compost bin and toss a layer on top each time you add food scraps.

If it's dry and dormant, you need more greens

Food scraps, weed clippings (no seeds, please), coffee grounds, small garden waste, manure (don't get fooled by the colour!), and fresh lawn clippings all bring nitrogen to the party, helping bacteria grow proteins. With the right balance (2 parts green to 1 part browns), everything breaks down just right, creating that toasty compost heat we love.



Don't forget the water!

Just like us, compost bacteria need a balanced diet - and that includes hydration. Once your



greens and browns are balanced, adding water keeps the compost party going.

Aerate, aerate, aerate!

Green Materials

Compost bins are great at holding all the materials together, but they could use a little help getting some fresh air. Use a garden fork or compost spiral to fluff it up occasionally. You could also use a perforated pipe in the centre of the pile to let in more air. Give your bacteria buddies some breathing room!

Sometimes, you just need to let it be

To complete the breakdown process, bacteria need time and space. Once your compost pile is stacked, cover it and let it rest for a few months while starting a new pile. With a little tending, your

compost can bounce back and become the perfect foundation for your spring garden. Happy composting!

KEEPING YOUR HOME SAFE FROM CATCHING FIRE THIS WINTER

There are multiple areas within your home that could lead to a fire. It only takes seconds for a small fire to become out of control.

There are thousands of house fires every year and they could all be prevented by following a simple checklist https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/fires-in-the-home/home-fire-safety-checklist.

Most fires start in the kitchen when cooking is left unattended, flammable items such as tea towels and curtains too close to the stove top can ignite, or grease and cooking oils that are built up on the stove top can catch fire while cooking which can rapidly spread into the range hood and up the walls. To prevent these types of fires, keep tea towels and other flammable items a safe distance away from the stove top and clean the stove top regularly to avoid grease and oil build up.



Follow these simple steps to keep your home fire safe this winter.

- 1. Clean out your chimney and flue prior to being used this winter.
- 2. Clean away any old ashes in your fireplace. Clean these away regularly during winter.
- If you have a gas heater, dust it off prior to using it for the first time this winter.
- 4. Turn of any heaters or put out any fires before leaving the house or going to sleep at night.
- 5. When drying clothing they need to be more than 1 meter away from a heater/fire.
- The same goes for a portable heater in a bedroom. It must be more than 1 meter away from any furniture or bedding.

- 7. Do not leave any appliances charging on a bed or couch. i.e., phone, laptop, ipad.
- 8. Do not ever leave cooking unattended in the kitchen.
- 9. Check your electric blanket for any kinks in the wiring.
- 10. Remove the lint from your dryer before and after each use.

Fire Escape Plans

House fires can develop very fast, much quicker than you think. Every home needs to have a plan for escaping a fire in their home. Having a plan in place helps to reduce any anxiety or panic that can arise when a fire happens.

CFA has created a template to help assist families create their own personalized escape plan, it can be found on this page https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare/fires-in-the-home/escape-plans.

When planning your escape plans it is important to include children in the process. Everybody in the home needs to know:

- The two quickest ways out of every room
- If you have a two storey home how you will exit from upstairs
- A meeting place outside the house i.e., the letterbox or across the road
- How you will call triple 000

It is vital that you reassess your home fire escape plan twice a year. It can be a good idea to do some fire drills and make it into a game by timing everyone. All children should know their address and how to call triple 000.



The Victorian Government's <u>Inquiry into Climate</u> <u>Resilience</u>, will look into the preparedness of communities facing climate disasters across the state.

The Legislative Council Environment and Planning Committee will inquire into the main risks facing Victoria's built environment and infrastructure from climate change and the impact these will have on the people of Victoria.

This is an opportunity for communities to share their experiences, stories, concerns, and ideas. People can have their say on the climate impacts they are concerned about and the risks that need to be considered in the adaptation process.

In 2024, communities are already battling intensifying climate impacts, such as bushfires, heatwaves, and floods. Disasters are increasing in frequency, becoming more unpredictable, and communities are experiencing compounding events at the same time.

The Inquiry will focus on the effects of climate impacts on Victoria's 'built environment'.
