

There's little to report on progress with the former Primary School site; planning and preparatory work continues.



The sign recognises Lionel's efforts over a 15-year period to create a carpark from vacant land owned by the Bowling Club. It started out as a slashing task and then became a mowing task. The sign was prepared and donated by Trafalgar Men's Shed.

We held games for the Victorian Open on Tuesday 28th and Thursday 30th March. As part of our efforts to raise funds towards our synthetic green we approached local businesses for prizes to run a raffle.

WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN THE NIGHT?

We might call it a Mopoke
Owl ,from it's familiar call, but it's
official name is Boobok, and it
could also be called Morepork;
Northern or Red Boobook Owl;
Marble or Spotted Owl or
Tasmanian Spotted Owl, depending
on where you happen to live in
Australia.

And they happen to be found in most parts of this wide country!

If you are lucky enough to catch sight of a Boobook owl in your torch light—as I did one night when putting the bins out—you will see an owl that looks like it is wearing a pair of black goggles on it's pale face.

It is a medium sized owl ,as owls go, about 30 cms.

The upper parts are chocolate brown, and under parts are mottled reddish-brown down to it's white-streaked belly. Juveniles are a bit lighter coloured.

They can live in pairs or family groups and roost by day, hidden in thick foliage .At dusk they venture out to sit on posts, branches, or fences, to watch for flying insects - maybe under street lights or farm outside lights as well .

They also eat small mammals such as house mice, and other small native animals such as small bats, catching them in mid air or pouncing on them.

Their specially adapted flight and body feathers allow them to fly silently from their vantage points; their prey has little chance of escaping!

Boobooks are not fussy home makers. They build their nests in tree hollows sparsely lined with leaves, wood shavings and small twigs ,or it might be bare!

The female lays 2-3 white rounded eggs and ,possibly with the help of



other females ,hatches and raises them.

So on still nights, keep an ear out for the haunting 'mopoke' call, and answering calls further away.

Google Bobook Owls and you will discover they have a range other calls as well.

Now the serious part of my story. A neighbour has on two recent occasions found a dead Boobook in his paddocks. Did it eat a mouse that had been poisoned?






Owl feathers have a leading edge shaped like a comb and a trailing edge with a fringe; these funnel air smoothly over the wing and dampen the sound. An owl's enormous wings, relative to its body size, also provide greater lift and enable it to fly slowly—as few as two miles per hour.

Press release from Victorian Electoral Commission

Because if you didn't, this is what will happen.

Close to 300,000 Victorians who appear to have failed to vote in the November 2022 State election will have an opportunity to explain why they didn't vote when they receive an 'Apparent failure to vote notice' in the coming days.

Acting Electoral Commissioner, Dana Fleming, says the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) is urging people who receive a notice to respond with a detailed explanation, as the VEC is required to issue a fine of \$92 if a person fails to respond within 28 days.

'An 'Apparent failure to vote notice' is not a fine – it's a chance to explain why you appear not to have voted,' Ms Fleming said.

'If you respond to the notice, you are much more likely to be excused.

'Completing and sending the notice back to us within the 28-day timeframe gives us a chance to consider your explanation and whether you can be excused.'

Voting in State elections is compulsory in Victoria.

The VEC worked to make voting in the 2022 State election as convenient and accessible as possible by:

- increasing the number of early voting centres by 50% (to 155)
- extending voting hours during the early voting period
- offering telephone assisted voting for those who are blind, have low vision or a physical disability and were unable to vote without assistance, or people impacted by the Victorian floods.

The option to vote by post was also available to all electors, and a drive-through voting centre was offered to COVID positive voters who were unable to vote in the last 3 days of the election and hadn't voted early or applied for a postal vote before applications closed.

The VEC also sent VoterAlert reminders by SMS and email to 2.5 million enrolled voters who had provided their contact details. Voters can sign up for VoterAlert at any time to be reminded to vote in all future State and local council elections at: vec.vic.gov.au/VoterAlert





Baw Baw Shire Mayor Annemarie McCabe has been appointed to the Local Government Mayoral Advisory Panel for 2023, alongside 12 other mayors from across Victoria.

The panel works alongside the Minister for Local Government, Melissa Horne to provide advice on legislative, regulatory, strategic and policy issues.

Driven by an interest to get involved with local government discussions at a higher level, Mayor McCabe says "it's all about being a part of the conversation".

One subject that Mayor McCabe aims to direct her attention to is the growing impact of cost shifting from State and Federal governments onto local governments working amidst the challenges of a rate-capped environment.

She also plans to go to bat for regional priorities, advocating for the most pressing needs of rapidly growing communities outside of metro Melbourne.



Baw Baw Shire Council is inviting the community to review and make submissions on the 2023/24 draft Annual Budget, Long Term Infrastructure Plan, Council Plan 2021-2025 (Annual Review 2023/24), Rating and Revenue Plan, and Long-Term Financial Plan.

Together, these documents detail how Council will invest our resources to deliver the services, infrastructure and support our community needs.

The Operating Budget represents income of \$129.54 million, expenditure of \$101.48 million, resulting in a surplus of \$28.06 million. This surplus figure is converted to an adjusted underlying result that better reflects Council's level of financial stability. This result excludes grants received for capital purposes which are non-recurrent and capital contributions from other sources. The adjusted underlying result for 2023/24 is an underlying deficit of \$3.44 million.

All community members are invited to review the draft Budget and key documents, and to make a submission in response.

Mr Gauci has served Baw Baw Shire for 11 years as Councillor, including 3 terms as Mayor. Many in the community will have worked closely with him over this time and his sudden resignation will come as a shock to them as it has to me.

On behalf of Baw Baw Shire Council, I'd like to express our gratitude for his service.

With regards to Mr Gauci's vacated Central Ward seat on Council, we are now in contact with the Victorian Electoral Commission and the required procedures are underway.

We will work though the next steps and processes in accordance with VEC regulations and will provide an update as soon as possible."

MANY POSSIBILITIES

Last month's article was an introspective look at whether there is future valued work for the YDCA to do.

Over the last 2 years there has been a need to respond to significant initiatives effectively controlled by others. The 2 most significant issues were C145 Amendment covering the 310+ subdivision east of Rollo Street and the Yarragon Township Plan (which is still to be finalised by Baw Baw Shire Council).

The future opportunities for YDCA are to:

- proactively create greater certainty for the town (beyond the scope of the Township Plan), and
- to fulfil our Constitution which states that our YDCA purposes are to:
- Encourage events that foster neighbourliness and a sense of community,
- Encourage input from residents on issues that affect our community
- 3) Exercise sound business judgement,
- Conduct all meetings in a positive and constructive atmosphere,
- Remain accountable always."

We (YDCA) set about to determine potential future initiatives that YDCA could undertake and came to the conclusion that there are future initiatives worth pursuing, including:

- reviewing the 2017 survey of residents and determining whether a new survey is required/worthwhile,
- developing a Master Plan to cover off matters raised in our Township Plan submission,
- seeking input to Township Plan strategies as they are developed by BBSC (and there are many),
- agreeing with BBSC on when community input will be sort on strategic initiatives,
- adding a new community event (in addition to Australia Day) that brings all/most community groups and the broader community together,
- establishing a local emergency response plan for different types of emergencies.
 The challenge now is to get an Executive at our AGM in July.

The next meeting of the YDCA will be held at the Fire Brigade building, Murray St, Yarragon on Tuesday 16 May 2023.

The first time I made quince jam it was an

onerous task; raw quinces are very hard to peel and core, then the pulp had to be pushed through a fine sieve, and I was making 4 times the quantity. Then I found the best recipe, and I have a jars of ruby red deliciousness on my window ledge to prove it



QUINCE JELLY/PASTE/JAM

1 litre water
2.5kg sugar
Bring to boil, then
simmer 15 min until
sugar is dissolved.

2.5-3kg whole quinces (about 8)
Wash, removing any fuzz.

Add to syrup and simmer until deep dark red, takes between 1&2 hours.

If making jelly (or syrup if it's a bit runny):
Remove fruit and set aside.
Check syrup on cold saucer to see if set point has been reached. If yes, pour into sterilized jars. If no, simmer longer then test again. If still no, call it syrup instead, but don't be too quick (like I was) to write your

If making paste:
Cool reserved quinces.
Remove cores and
discard.
Purée flesh.
Measure 1/2 cup sugar
for every 1 cup purée.
Spread thinly on baking
trays and bake 24-30
hours at 50°C.


labels, because it

If making jam:
Remove cores from
quinces and purée the
flesh.
Add puree to syrup.
Simmer until set point is
reached, then pour into
sterilized jars.

However you prepare it, you get to enjoy the spoils of harvest all year round.
