DISAPPOINTMENT ABOUT ROLLO ST TREE REMOVAL

Several residents rang or spoke to me about their shock and sadness at the recent removal of twelve trees at the old Yarragon Primary School Site, the new Rollo Street Park. This was also reported in the Gazette (below).

One of the reasons I joined the Yarragon Project Reference Group was to ensure that our community was notified about upcoming changes based on council works.

warragul drouin, gazette The phone rang hot with complaints from the Yarragon community after 12 trees were removed at the old primary school site. D

Disappointed residents said they had no notification trees at the Rollo St site would be cut down. They said one tree - a cypress - was at least 100-years-old and didn't need to be felled.

They alleged some trees had been

Unfortunately, I had to miss the last meeting and when I read through the minutes, I saw that there was a notification that there would be tree works on the 27th of June. That information had come in too late to be included in the June newsletter. "Monday 27 June some of the trees will be removed from the park, non-native, damaged / diseased or not fit for purpose, this is also occurring to make way for the drainage improvements."

However, it turns out that the actual tree removal was scheduled for 27 May rather than June. Apparently, this date error was made in the minute-taking process, not an incorrect date provided by Council, although a cynical

reading would note that this avoided an outcry and protests. Once a tree has been cut down, it can't be undone regardless of how sad it has made people or how innocent the minute taking error. It left the PRG no chance to notify the community, although apparently, council officers did a letter box drop to nearby residents about the tree removal works a few days in advance.

In going through the information provided to the PRG, it is hard to explicitly see that the large Cypress in particular was planned for removal. Although not the only tree removed, the Cypress on the fence line of Rollo St was a particularly prominent tree and one that was mentioned as an emotional loss by several locals. I have checked the diagrams and it was not planned for removal in the masterplan from December 2021.

Of course, there is a footnote: "*Note: Trees are subject to an arborist to assess condition and safety. Trees that deemed to be a higher risk and recommended for removal will need be removed." Despite the English not quite making sense, this does offer the decisions cover.

I spoke to a council officer, also a member of the PRG, and they informed me that the trees that were removed were assessed by both internal and external arborists on value, amenity in the park's re-design, lifespan, heritage value and condition. There were issues with tree health and longevity as well as root issues for drainage and paving. In good news, 18 trees remain on the site and the plans include the planting of 63 new trees in the park. In time, the park will be greener than ever, but this step in the process will leave a bitter taste for a while.

As a step towards avoiding this sort of shock occurring in the future, see page 8 for information about tree assessments planned for Campbell Street. Also see page 12 for a reminder of the first steps towards this park for our community.





WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN MY GARDEN?

OR: WHAT I SEE ON MY WALKS

I have always associated the call of Currawongs with my visits to Sydney or country New South Wales (that distinctive loud "currawong", deep croaks and even a "wolf whistle"). But they have always been here too. In fact, Currawongs can be heard around Eastern parts of Australia from Northern Queensland around to Western Australia and Tasmania.

There are three types: Pied Currawong (Queensland to Western Victoria), Grey Currawong (from Victoria to Southern Western Australia) and Black Currawong (only in Tasmania and the Bass Strait Islands).

Their other names include (Pied) Bell -Magpie, Black or Mountain Magpie, Tullawong, Chillawong, Currawang, Otway Forester, Jay or Rain Bird. Around here we will see the Pied Currawong.

Their habitat includes forests, wood lands, coastal scrub, farms and crop lands, rubbish dumps, picnic grounds, street parks and gardens. They have even been recorded breeding in Sydney parks.

Pied Currawongs are a large, mostly black bird with bright yellow eyes, (that can give you an intense look if you get too close), small patches of white under their tail tips and base of their wings that can be more easily seen in flight. Their bill is large, black and strong and their legs are dark grey -black. Females are sometimes greyer in their under parts and juveniles are duller and sometimes browner. They can be seen singly, in pairs and sometimes gathered in flocks of 50 or so particularly in winter.

Currawongs feed on insects and grubs in the ground and prey on skinks, small bird and chicks, as well as small possums and road kill. They also love



berries and picnic leftovers. They might hang food on a tree for later like a Butcher Bird.

They can be a bit bossy and frighten

small birds away, so don't be tempted to feed Currawongs in your back garden. Instead, plant strappy, dense and spiky shrubs to provide a safe refuge for the little birds to hide and

Pied Currawongs also have a bully to cope with. The Channel Billed Cuckoo lays its eggs in the Currawong's nest (not in Victoria though). They don't push the Currawong's eggs out as other cuckoos do. The Cuckoo chicks just demand all the food and the Currawong chicks starve.

The nest is a flattish platform of sticks lined with root fibres, grass and bark placed 5-15 metres up in a leafy tree. The female lays three light brown freckled eggs blotched darker brown. The male feeds the female while she is raising their chicks.

As I write this, two Currawongs are poking about in the trees in my back garden. I am close to the Yarragon Wetlands and dog park where there are lots of big trees. Maybe they are coming down from the hills for the winter.

So enjoy the penetrating calls of the Pied Currawongs while they are here and don't be alarmed by the piercing look from their bright beady eyes if you get too close while walking through the wetlands.

New 120L purple-lidded glass recycling bins are being delivered to households with a Council residential kerbside collection service from now until the end of August, with Warragul and Drouin the first two local towns to start receiving the new glass recycling bin.

Starting in September, residents should begin putting glass bottles and jars into the new glass recycling bin, ready for the first collection in October. The glass recycling bin will be collected on a four-weekly basis.


The Yarragon Craft and Produce Market is a fully volunteer-run market that proudly donates back to the community. This month we donated \$6000 across the following organisations:

HEADS UP ABOUT TREE ASSESSMENT CAMPBELL ST

A council officer notified the Yarragon PRG that Drouin Tree Services have been appointed to undertake a detailed tree assessment of all the trees along Campbell Street within the red area on the map to the right.

The assessment was due to start the week commencing 24 June 2024. It will produce a report highlighting the Species, Tree Measurements, Health and Condition, Defects, Useful Life Expectancy, Retention value and any Overlays applicable.

The information gathered from this report will feed into the design of Campbell Street.

The PRG have already had a heads up in one of our meetings that quite a few of these trees are not healthy. Due to their growth form water is pooling in the centre, leading to rot.

WINTER IN THE VEGGIE PATCH

As the winter settles in, outdoor activities may seem less appealing. Hopefully, your broccoli and cauliflower are already thriving! Layer up and wander the garden...it's good for the soul!

When planting carrots (which take a few months to grow), consider planting radishes at the same time. This serves two purposes: radishes sprout quickly, marking where you planted the seeds, and you can harvest them before the carrots require more space. A bountiful radish crop can be pickled with vinegar, sugar, and mustard seeds. Recipe:

Snow peas, known for their charm with beautiful white flowers and crisp green peas, will require a trellis for climbing support. Their growth rate may

slow down until September, but a bountiful harvest awaits. The more you pick, the more they yield!

Broad beans have a weighty structure so use stakes and twine to support them in rows. Broad beans can be enjoyed sautéed in butter or blended into falafel. Add their flowers and leaf tips to salads for extra flavour.

Keep planting both peas and broad beans up to the end of winter. They have a great ability to 'nitrogen fix', which means they capture and store nitrogen in small nodes on their roots. After they finish producing, trim the stems at the base to allow the nitrogen to be released into the soil ready for your next crop.

Electrical House Fires on the Rise

House fires have been on the rise in the past 12 months with more than 780 occurring in 2023 in

Victoria. At least 140 of those were caused by electrical equipment including appliances and air conditioning. This year across the state there have been over 60 house fires due to electrical equipment.



It is vital that we don't overlook all the electrical equipment we have in our homes. You can take some simple steps to reduce the risk of a fire starting by:

- Not using damaged or faulty electrical equipment.
- Not using double adapters.
- Not charging electrical equipment such as laptops/ipads/phones on soft surfaces such as a couch or bed.
- Ensuring that all computers/monitors/ laptops, televisions and other electrical equipment have good air flow around them and are not confined to small or enclosed spaces.
- Turning off all appliances at the switch when not in use.
- Only using power boards according to manufacturers instructions. Not overloading them, or having loose cables and always checking them for signs of damage.
- Only using certified tradespersons to repair damaged/faulty electrical equipment and wiring.

However, an interesting relationship has developed between the 'Through Life Physiotherapist' in Brandy Creek Road, Warragul where the Arts Alliance has a changing exhibition every two months. View the macrame work of Heather Easton over the months of July and August.

If you are looking for unique, creative gifts make sure you take time in the shops at both 'Station Gallery', Yarragon and the 'Artspaces' in the former Trafalgar Railway Station. Many of the works have been produced by members of the wide range of Art groups that



Ty started playing football in 2016, when he was 9 years old in Under 10's here at Yarragon Juniors.






