The next time you go to the hairdresser, think about how your haircut can help the environment or be turned into a wig for those with cancer or alopecia.

Twenty ponytails of 20 cm or more in length are needed to make a wig, while shorter clippings are transformed into compost or floating hair booms to absorb oil spills in the sea.

We came to know about this because back in May Oscar decided to cut his long hair and wanted to donate it. Turns out that our own Wildflower Studio was already onto it.

Oscar produced 15 plaits of beautiful quality hair which will probably go into wigs and he got a lovely certificate.

A few weeks ago I (Christina) decided to cut my very long hair too. I didn't go into Wildflower (sorry Gemma), just did it myself on the couch in front of the tv. I only managed to produce two very thin plaits that taper to almost nothing. But one is 40 cm long. And still no-one has noticed the difference!

Regardless, I will be proud to have my hair composted or mopping up oil spills.



WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN MY GARDEN?

How could I have not mentioned Kookaburras before? They gather in family groups on the cross arms of the power pole in my back garden and cackle, chortle and just laugh with such delight and enthusiasm, encouraging others nearby to join in. It brightens my day.

Laughing Kookaburras are the largest members of the Kingfisher family.

Over the years they have been given a wonderful range of names Alarm bird; Breakfast bird; Bushman's,

Settler's or Shepherd's Clock; Brown,


Great Brown or Laughing Kingfisher;

Jack, Jackass, Jacko, Jacky, John, Johny;

Kooka, Laughing Jack; Ha Ha or Woop

Woop Pigeon. It's a good thing they don't have to fill in any official forms!

Kookaburras were originally found all along the Eastern seaboard of Australia and around to about Adelaide, but in the distant past they were introduced to Tasmania and the bottom corner of Western Australia. They are a stocky bird with a long strong beak for catching their prey. We all recognise their mottled brown back and white front but have you been close enough to see the blue



markings in their wings and how, when they land, they flick their tail up?

From their vantage point on a tree branch or fence post they search the ground for food. Kookaburras are mainly carnivorous, dining on mice, snakes, yabbies, insects, small reptiles and young from other bird's nests, and maybe an unattended sausage from your BBQ!! Unfortunately their introduction into Western Australia in the 1890's has had a devastating effect on some of the local lizards.

Kookaburras mate for life. They build a nest on decayed debris in a hollow trunk or limb up to 20 m high.

Occasionally they might choose a hole in a creek bank, termite nest, haystack or cavity in a wall. The female lays 2-4 white roundish eggs. Non-breeding family members will help with the raising of the chicks. Even though the chicks are blind at "birth" the first hatched ones will kill the ones that hatch later!!



You will find Kookaburras in open woodland, forest clearings, farming country with trees, orchards and city parks. Further inland they like to live near timbered water courses.

I hope you enjoy hearing the call of these happy birds as much as I do, even if it might be very early in the morning.


YARRAGON.

The first week of October was unusually busy for the brigade. It started with a callout for our tanker at about 5am on Sunday the 1st to be part of a fleet of 20 tankers heading for Erica where a fire was burning out of control in heavy bush and heading towards Walhalla. Our task on that day was to protect the Walhalla tourist railway station which was under threat.

We returned home from that job at about 6pm as the station was no longer under threat. The following day should have been a quiet day, but we knew there were three fires still burning in East Gippsland. Sure enough, we received a page at about 6pm to meet in Warragul ASAP to catch a bus to Sale to assist at the Loch Sport fire. Three of us answered the call and were soon on the way to Sale along with about 20 other people to pick up the fire trucks we were to use at Loch Sport. Another 5 vehicles were going to meet us there to help protect the town.

We made it to Loch Sport but unfortunately, the only road in and out of town was closed before the other team could get through. We were alone to defend the town, but fortunately had a good team of 4WDs manned by Forest Fire Management staff, who were actively fighting the fire in the scrub. In order to protect the assets and people in the town, we set up defensive positions around the town and along the golf course waiting for the fire to reach us. Strong winds were fanning the fire and predicted wind changes during the night were expected to pose an even greater threat to the town.

We patrolled all night and it was not until mid-day that the road was reopened and our replacements could get through. By this time the fire had reached the edge of town and some of our very weary team were kept busy





maintaining a control line outside the edge of town. Just as our replacement crews arrived, so did some most welcome rain, which helped to slow the fire's progress. In the meantime, another three of Yarragon's Fire Brigade members had been called out to help for a day on the Briagolong fire, which had also been experiencing the same strong winds that we had at Loch Sport.

I am pleased to say that all of our members are safely back home, although some were feeling very tired after being on the fireground for an extended period. It's most unusual to have three very large fires break out at this time of year, and is perhaps a warning of what the rest of the summer may bring. It's also worth noting that each of these fires was started by a campfire or burnoff which the owners had thought were out. When you leave a fire, it is important that the ashes are cold to touch, don't rely on

not seeing any smoke or embers. It is also worth noting, that even after more than 100mm of rain, all three fires are still burning and the Briagolong fire is still not under control.


"Victoria is one of the most bushfire-prone areas in the world so it's vital to plan ahead. Make sure your household has a Bushfire Survival Plan. We have lots of great resources available for residents at the CFA website. For those who would like to get involved more directly and help the CFA, our brigades are recruiting now. Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS)

The new system has been in place since September 2022. Each rating indicates how dangerous a bushfire would be IF it were to start. It does not indicate the likelihood of a fire starting on that particular day. This new system is the same across all states and territories so that when travelling everyone can be familiar with the information being provided. There are now just 4 ratings to simplify the message and avoid confusion.

Moderate = Plan and Prepare

- Most fires in this category can be controlled.
- You need to stay up to date and be ready to act if there is a fire.



High = Prepare to Act

- Fires in this category can be dangerous.
- You need to be alert for fires in your area as there is a heightened risk. You need to decide what you will do if a fire does start.
- If a fire starts, your life and property may be at risk. The safest option is to avoid bushfire risk areas.

Extreme = Take action now to protect your life and property

- Fires in this category will spread very quickly and can be extremely dangerous.
- You need to make sure your fire plan and property are fire ready.
- If a fire starts, take immediate action. If you and your property are not prepared to the highest level, go to a safer location well before the fire impacts.
- If you are travelling, avoid travelling through bushfire risk areas.
- Expect hot, dry and windy conditions.
- It is recommended that you leave bushfire risk areas early in the day as this is your safest option.

Catastrophic = For your survival, leave bushfire risk area

These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire. If a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost.

- Your life may depend on the decisions you make, even before there is a fire.
- For your survival, do not be in bushfire risk areas.
- Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.
- If a fire starts and takes hold, lives and properties are likely to be lost.
- Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions. You may not be able to leave and help may not be available.



The white line indicates if a fire were to start no action would be required by you but to be aware of what is happening.

Yarragon's First Public Electric Vehicle Charger

This project is being facilitated by the Gippsland Climate Change Network (GCCN), funded by AGL and supported by the Uniting Church. The charging station will enable locals and visitors to Yarragon to top up their EV while enjoying the town's facilities.

This initiative is another step in the Yarragon Uniting Church's journey to achieving **carbon neutral status**. GCCN has also helped us install solar panels which will help offset the energy used in the Church and hall along with offsetting the energy to charge EVs.

Other improvements already implemented include removal of gas heaters/appliances in the Church hall, installing energy efficient appliances, and draft-proofing the hall thanks to the Baw Baw Sustainability Network. Be ready to plug in!



SUSTAINABILITY, THE SHOWING OF THE DOCU-MENTARY 'THE LAKE OF SCARS' AND THE BAW BAW SHIRE'S 'SIGNIFICANT TREE STUDY'



Communities living sustainably and flourishing

On Thursday 27th October more than 30 community members attended a successful film night hosted by the Baw Baw Sustainability Network in Yarragon. The audience gathered to watch 'The Lake of Scars' documentary directed by Bill Code and narrated by Uncle Jack Charles. The film, described as 'a portrait of a hidden facet of Australian history and environment', examines what reconciliation can look like in Australia. This poignant, fascinating, and beautiful film sparked a lively audience discussion which focussed on the implications, necessity and urgency of protecting the natural environment in the West Gippsland region.

Attendees spoke passionately about their environmental activism and noted that the Baw Baw Shire Council had issued an invitation to 'all community members to participate in a shire-wide Significant Tree Study to nominate exceptional, eligible trees throughout Baw Baw and identify them within a Significant Tree Register'.

The audience had representation from widespread parts of the Shire. Residents' concern, for what is considered wanton elimination of trees, has grown with the explosion of housing developments in our shire. Their helplessness in the face of perceived inaction by the Baw Baw Shire Council in the matter of tree protection was palpable. People need trees for many reasons. Climate change is one of these.

Local knowledge is so very important. The Baw Baw Sustainability Network and audience members urged everyone in the Shire to identify stands of trees, linkages of trees for continuous canopies and individual trees, even decrepit old dead trees for their habitat significance, and enter these on the register.




