WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN MY ROOF?!?

Starlings! The bane of our life for many when they decide to live in our roof. I have just had a nest removed from my bedroom ceiling after being woken most mornings by scuffling sounds from above. Almost half a bale of hay was pulled out - very industrious birds. How did they manage to drag so much stuff through a very tiny gap between the tiles?! Now they are dancing on next door's roof complaining bitterly and plotting a way to get back in—but I am watching.



Starlings are not native to Australia. They are found in Europe and England. They were brought here in the 1860s by English settlers and have become well established in Eastern Australia from Queensland, through New South Wales and Victoria to South Australia. So they can also be called English Starlings. There is a relative in Northern Queensland called the Shining or Metallic Starling. It has a lustrous black plumage.

The Common Starlings around here have varying plumage according to the season. In Autumn their new plumage is glossy black with purple and green metallic highlights and white spots on the end of their body feathers. Bills and legs are dark brown. In breeding

season adults are all glossy black with yellow beaks and bills, so they are often confused with Blackbirds. Juveniles are dull grey brown.

Starlings feed on



seeds and insects in lawns and paddocks as well as taking spiders, worms, household scraps and fruit crops such as cherries and grapes. They are a problem in orchards as they damage the fruit and leave their droppings. They often feed in large flocks fouling cattle feed in intensive feeding lots.

At breeding time Starlings build an untidy cup of grass, twigs and human rubbish in tree hollows and roof voids. They will drive out native birds. When the three or so pale blue eggs are hatched the chicks are raised by both parents.

Their call is harsh, chattering and wheezing—not melodic. They and noisy and unsightly when they decide to roost in shopping centres and parks...and the tree outside our railway station....contaminating the surrounding area with their droppings.

Doesn't sound like a bird to love, but, Starlings have one redeeming feature that has given us a beautiful word to roll around on your tongue. Murmuration. It is the term used to describe huge flocks of individual starlings swirling around at dusk without bumping into each other as they select a roosting for the night. It also makes it harder for birds of prey e.g. Peregrine Falcons, to catch them.

This month, we are going to keep building on from the article in the September issue, which talked to starting your vegetation management around the house! Well, it has been a wild spring so far, and we've had a random assortment of weather patterns, leading to all kinds of conditions. Hot sunny days, extreme winds blowing over trees, followed by days of continuous rain. These weather conditions lead to more significant fire behaviour than what most might think. Increases in the growth of grass will build more fuel that can be consumed in a grass fire.

I'm sure I'm not the only person in town that needs to mow there lawn twice a week to keep it under control at the moment! People will start to see the paddocks on the edge of town getting more length to the grass. A few warm days coupled with the wind will very quickly dry out grass, and the fire season will be on us before we know it.

As the weather continues to warm, you might start to see the Fire Danger Ratings arrow moving to a different direction on a metal sign, or a few different lights on the electronic signs around the place. These lights will have been dull for the past few months, but as

the warmer weather nears, the lights will glow more frequently. If you drive towards Melbourne or the Latrobe Valley along the highway regularly, you will often drive past these boards!

Each colour represents a step in Fire Danger, and an associated with an Action, how you should prepare yourself and your family depending on where you live. This might mean cancelling plans to go see friends or family in the

bush, picking a different route to go to work, or even implementing your Bushfire Plan. There are four levels in the Fire Danger Ratings. (see above).

There are times where you might see 'No Rating', with the arrow pointing to the white bar below Moderate. These days are where there is no proactive action is required by the community. This does not mean that fires cannot or don't occur, but that any fires that start are not likely to move or act in a way that threatens the safety of the community. Victoria is spread into 9 separate Fire Weather

Districts. The mapping of these Districts is based on weather and geological features which play a significant factor in the vegetation and fire behaviour. In Gippsland, they are then loosely aligned to our council boundaries to make it simple to remember. Yarragon (and all of Baw Baw Shire) is within the West and South Gippsland District. It only takes a quick drive along the highway to Bunyip before we transition into the Central District.

The VRI Hall was established in 1941 with a rich history of housing members of the Railway Institute, an angling club, dance groups and now members of the Creative Arts community. It is

an ideal environment in which people relaxed during readings, listened to music played on the upright piano and shared in afternoon tea.

Yvette is determined to offer opportunity for greater sharing of the work of writers of all levels of experience and talent. Rodney Williams, a widely published poet and coordinator of the Arts Alliance 'Writers' Group', was the guest reader and writer at the first 'Poetry Bauhaus' performance and he looks forward to the next function.



Knitting poppies for ANZAC Day is a way of remembering, honouring and thanking our service men and women.




