

WHAT BIRD IS THAT ON MY

I haven't managed to get close enough to check out their faces or notice the pale yellow hackles on their lower neck. I will have to sneak down to the dam with binoculars at the ready to make close observations. These colours are less pronounced in non breeding herons and juveniles.

You will find them all over Australia, nearby islands and New Zealand. They frequent wetlands, dams, parks, golf courses, orchards, swamps and tidal flats, perching on trees or posts looking for crustaceans, frogs and fish in the water and insects and other prey on land. All herons use three techniques to catch their prey... standing and waiting, slow stalk or active pursuit, with all ending in a dramatic plunge with their long pointed beaks.



Their nest is an untidy, shallow arrangement of sticks in a leafy branch 5-12 metres high, usually over water, where three to five pale blue eggs are laid.

In the past (early 1900's), many heron species were shot just at mating time to collect their mating plumage to supply the milinary trade, thus, less eggs laid and flocks under threat. This has now been stopped but it is still important to maintain wetland habitats and leave them undisturbed for all sorts of water birds , not just Herons.

So I (and I hope you) will continue to delight at seeing these tall grey Herons languidly flapping their grey wings across the sky, squaarking their raspy, irritated cry. I wonder what they are annoyed about??!!



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


SPOT THE DIFFERENCES

SPOTLIGHT ON A MEMBER AND PREPARATION By Tegan Brown, Secretary & Community Safety Officer

Over the course of the next 12 months we will be spotlighting some of our members in amongst the regular fire safety information. Colin very succinctly describes how I also feel about being a part of the Yarragon Fire Brigade.



Introducing Colin Lackman

"I joined the brigade in 2016 after talking to a couple of members and finding out that I was not too old to become a firefighter. The main reason I joined was because I felt that it was unfair of me to expect other people to protect my house if I wasn't prepared to do anything myself. After joining, I learnt there is a lot more to the CFA than just fighting fires. I have acquired many new skills, such as how to properly use and maintain a chainsaw, safely drive a 4WD in all types of terrain and, of course, how to suppress different types of fire.

I enjoy being part of the Yarragon brigade as I find it a rewarding way to be part of the community, the brigade members are friendly and I have learnt many new skills. I have found it satisfying to be able to assist people in challenging times, both in the local area and further afield including East Gippsland, Northern river floods and even the NSW fires.

After about 18 months of service I was fortunate to be elected to the BMT, (Brigade Management Team), as a lieutenant, and I am also the brigade health and

safety officer. Like most brigade members, I have a wide range of roles including crew leader, internal rescue and I also look after the care and maintenance of the hoses.

I would encourage everyone, regardless of age or sex (Yarragon has quite a few female firefighters) to consider joining Yarragon Fire Brigade. You don't have to devote a lot of time to the brigade, but you may find you want to once you become part of the action. After joining, you will be given general firefighter training, with a heavy influence on safety, and then there are some minimal activities you must undertake each year to keep your skills up to date. Once you have completed your basic training, there is an almost endless amount of optional courses available to you, including leadership courses, general life skills and of course more advanced firefighting skills."

September Fire Safety

Spring is here and so is some warmer weather. It's time for the annual "Spring Clean" of the house and the GARDEN. We all know that this year is shaping up to be drier than the previous few years so it's best to get a start on the yard clean up now well before the warmer drier weather sets in.

Garden Clean Up Checklist

- Keep the lawns short with regular mowing (no more than 10 cm high).
- Rake up leaves and small twigs.
- Remove lower branches of trees.
- Prune shrubs and keep them away from windows.
- When mulching use rocks or pebbles as these are not flammable.
- Tidy up and move wood piles away from the house.



Clean the gutters.

Lastly it is also a great time to sit down as a family and reassess your Fire Escape Plan. Being well prepared is crucial. It is a good idea to have the plan written down, as in an emergency not everyone can remember finite details or think clearly. YDCA UPDATE

This article covers the period of the last two months as no Yarragon & District Community Association article was included in the August edition of the Yarragon Newsletter.

The July monthly meeting was held on 18 July and then followed by the AGM. The usual order of meetings would be the AGM followed by the monthly meeting but since no nominations had been received prior to the meeting it was decided we needed to discuss options and actions prior to the AGM. The focus of the ordinary monthly meeting was on what happens next if a new Executive could not be found. The AGM confirmed that a new Executive hasn't been found.

Discussions centred around options and decisions that will need to be made. Consequently, a Special Meeting was called for 15 August to make important decisions. At the Special Meeting of the 15 August members were given 2 options:

- Agree to change the YDCA Constitution to avoid the need to meet monthly with the current Executive willing to continue for a further 12 months, or
- Close down the YDCA.

Members voted overwhelmingly (11 in favour, 2 against) to change the Constitution.

Consequently, a further Special Meeting has been called for 19 September to formally vote on the proposed Constitutional changes. This vote includes proxy voting for those members who cannot be present at the actual meeting.

In the meantime, a number of sub-committees have been formed to deal with issues as they arise, such as the next draft of the Yarragon Township Plan and Urban design Framework, the Yarragon Streetscape Masterplan and one to determine rules under which certain funds can be accessed.

So, the next meeting of the YDCA will be the Special Meeting to be held at the Fire Brigade building, Murray St, Yarragon on Tuesday 19 September 2023, commencing at 7pm.






There were lots of Harry Potterthemed costumes (12), but Emily was the only one who thought of just being a background character in Harry

Do you need small quality gifts for special occasions? Look no further than the 'Station Gallery', Princes Highway, Yarragon. This is the home of the Baw Baw Arts Alliance; a beautiful space often missed because it is on the 'wrong' side of the highway for those who shop in Yarragon.

It is worth taking the time to cross the highway to the former Yarragon Railway Station building to see the range of locally produced creative Artworks. A recent addition to the Artwork is the small book, 'Rescue Cat', by writer Rodney Williams. 'Rescue Cat' features tanka, a traditional form of short verse from Japan, similar to haiku. Rodney's poems place a strong focus on nature, with much of his work celebrating Gippsland: its countryside and waterways; its birds and animals.

One Artist who is having trouble keeping up with customer demand is ceramicist Linda McInnes. Linda's range includes brightly coloured mini pots, mini bowls, mini toadstools and decorative covers for hydroponic plant containers.

While browsing the gallery shop take time to view the September exhibitions by local painters Anita George and Ingrid Thomas. Anita's exhibition, 'Calligraphic Marks', is a demonstration of her continued love of both calligraphy and painting. Her work is an eclectic mix of abstract calligraphic style marks and legible words but the crowning achievement is a 7 metre paper roll painted in different styles of calligraphy, with different implements in different mediums.

Painter Ingrid Thomas continues the abstract theme with her work, 'Abstractions', bringing the usual joy to viewers through her use of vibrant coloured acrylic paint. 
TV Exposure: Yarragon recently featured on an episode of the Channel 10 'reality' show "Hunted". This can still be seen on 10Play Series 2, Episode 7 first shown Sunday July 30. 'Fugitives' involved are Sonja and Ellerina.

Yarragon Track: Good work by Council in grading the Yarragon – Leongatha Road section of the Yarragon Track. A senior Council Officer recently remarked that, despite no formal count being kept, the Yarragon Track is considered the most heavily-used walking track in Baw Baw Shire.

Stormwater Drainage: Although Council consideration of our overall concerns on Stormwater Drainage has not yet been completed, we have been advised that cleaning of the main Stormwater drains in Waterloo Road will be carried out once the Rail Contractors have completed their works in the area. The efficiency of these drains are vital as they carry the majority of stormwater from Yarragon township, under the rail line, then eventually to the Contour Drain and the Moe River.

Former School Site, Rollo Street: Ongoing detailed planning of the site had been delayed by staffing changes and a restructure within the relevant department. However, a main design contractor is now expected to be appointed next month and it is intended earthworks will commence at the beginning of the year.

Campbell Street 're-build', Loch Street 're-build': Initial discussions have taken place with the relevant Project Manager, and a progress update is expected next month.



A GOOD READ By John Wallace, Carlton North


I thoroughly enjoyed reading the Community Newsletter on the way back to Melbourne the other night.


