WHAT BIRD IS THAT IN DOWNTOWN **YARRAGON?**

It was a Brown Goshawk!!!

The Tuesday Craft ladies looked up from their crafting to see a strange bird on the fence outside the Uniting Church Hall.



It sat there calmly showing off its brown barred chest feathers, hooked dark beak and yellow legs, moving further down the fence to show us its brown back and long brown tail. Then it flew off. What a treat to see!

On checking my bird references I am pretty sure it was a male. The female is bigger and has a slate grey or light brown back with a rufous collar across the nape of the neck. The chest and under parts are barred rufous and white. They are very similar to the Collared Goshawk but the Collared Goshawk has a squarer tail. One of my books says "strong ridge over the eyes gives a beetle browed look." So, if you are close enough to a Goshawk and it gives you the eye don't take it personally.



Both Brown and Collared Goshawks can be found all over Australia as well as Australia's Northern and Pacific Islands. They can also be called Chicken Hawk or Pacific Goshawk.

As mentioned above, the females are bigger and stronger than the males.

Both are agile flyers but can glide or float on rounded wings after a few strong wing beats.

The mating season will see them high above, tails fanned and performing spectacular aerobatics or circling each other.

Their typical hunting method is to quietly wait in some shelter, then dash out to grab their prey in the air or on the ground. They catch mainly rabbits but also smaller birds (I once saw a Goshawk snatch a baby Willy Wagtail off my clothes line) small mammals and reptiles.



Their flattish nest is built 6-20 metres up in a tree using sticks and lining with eucalyptus leaves. Two or three plain bluish white eggs are laid.



They are sometimes faintly blotched red-brown (maybe to brighten up the decor of their nest!).

The call is a rapid "ki ki ki" which is quite similar to the call of the Collared Goshawk which might lead to confusion if you don't get a good look, unless they obligingly sit on a nearby fence to be studied.

So when you are going to the Post Office or Supermarket in Yarragon, keep an eye out for a largish bird with a barred brown chest giving you "the eye".


The AGM was held in July, we had a little hiccup, we could not get a full committee. The August market was cancelled, but all good we now have a full committee on board and the September market will go ahead as






Errata

PRING HAS SPRUNG!

How exciting, spring is here, the days are getting longer, the weather is warming and hopefully no more of those icy frosts! Over the next few months, we will go through a few different topics relating to bushfire, from how to understand fire danger and warnings, having a bushfire plan, and preparing for fire. First up, we will look into preparing your home to reduce the risk of fire around your property.

From a small house in town to a property on the escarpment, it is time to start thinking about preparing your property before summer, its crucial to start your planning for bushfire well before the season starts. Yarragon is a small township with properties in and around the area exposed to Grassland and Dense Bushland. Getting in early to clean up around your property is the best way to pre-

There are three main threats to houses in a bushfire. These are Embers, Heat and Flames.

Embers are the burning pieces of bark, leaves and twigs. • They'll be carried by the wind and may start spot fires in and around your property. Embers are the most common way houses are ignited in a bushfire. The embers can be very fine, and get into small gaps in roofs, window frames and subfloor spaces.

Heat from bushfires can be intense. The radiant heat from a bushfire can cause glass to break, or woodpiles and timber cladding on the side of your house to ignite. Even without flame contact will be destructive. If you live in an extreme fire risk area, management of vegetation is crucial in reducing the chance of the flame from a fire im- When it comes to clearing trees and vegetation, some pacting your property.

The CFA has some great guides to assist with preparing you property for fire, and Landscaping to reduce the impact of fire. The Landscaping guide comes with suggestion Early cleanup around the house and property will ensure ity of your property to ember attacks.

Inside the Property Preparation guideline, it will talk through some really easy ideas to help manage your property.





Some of these are:

- Keep grass cut below 10cm in height (and remove your clippings).
- Keep gutters clear of leaf litter and debris.
- Use non-combustible materials like rocks or pebbles in garden beds.
- Keep large shrubs and bushes away from windows and glazed elements of your house.
- Move your firewood piles to more than 10m from the house.
- Locate mature trees strategically to shield the house from embers and radiant heat.
- Remove all overhanging branches over the roof and keep branches 10m clear of the house.

exemptions apply with the 10/30m and 10/50m rules. Make sure you check and comply with any local council laws in doing so.



Senior's Month occurs annually in October across the nation and celebrates getting older while creating opportunities for older people to meet and make new connections.




Matt is a young star who started playing football in 2016 and has already amassed a whopping 130 games for Yarragon.
